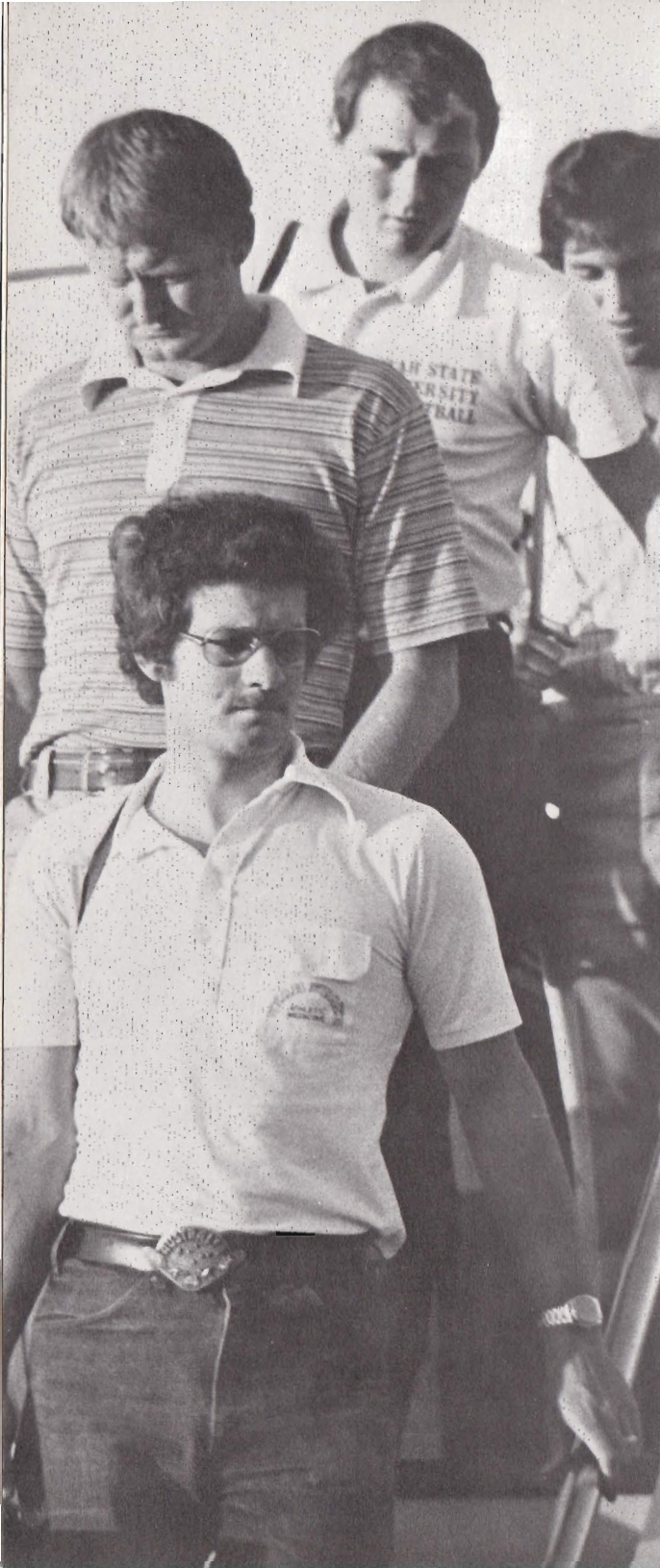

# Aggies' Down Under Trip,

Utah State Head Coach Dutch Belnap returns three-fourths of the points his team scored last year, in the persons of nine 1976-77 squadmembers, and with enough good, new talent (which he feels is on hand) Belnap thinks his team will improve over a year ago.

Nobody's arguing with the Aggie coach, whose 15-12 record a year ago pushed his four-year mark to 66-40.

And even with the headstart such veteran talent affords the Ags, consider the 19-game tour the team made during June and July throughout New Zealand and Australia. (They went 18-1)

"It was just like another season for us," said Belnap. "It was a tremendous thing for us in coming together as a team. I've talked to Dick Harter at Oregon and Gale Catlett at Cincinnati and other coaches who've made those sort of summer tours, and they've all remarked how much it meant to their success in the season that followed."

A senior triumvirate — center **Mike Santos**, forward **Blair Martineau** and guard **Oscar Williams** — form the heart of the Aggies. Those three, and junior forward **Preston Bailess**, were considered starters most of last year.

Belnap feels Santos, a 6-8 postman from Inglewood, California's Morningside High, is a legitimate all-America candidate. The coach's opinion is based on Santos' play as a junior, particularly against the Kent Bensons (Indiana) and David Greenwoods (UCLA) of college basketball.

Santos was Utah State's leading scorer (18.2), rebounder (11.3) and shooter (.532) as a junior. He is 15th among the nation's best returning rebounders.

With the 6-5 Martineau, a 14.3 scorer and the team's best defender a year ago, and the 5-11

# Key to a Better Season?

this could be one of the best teams Utah State has had, if everything falls into place. We found out in our pre-season drills this is a team with much more intensity than clubs we've had here the past few years.

"We're just a little apprehensive because 40% of this team is brand new. We have five freshmen and a junior college player who haven't played major college basketball. But there are some good athletes in that group, good enough that some of our returning starters from last year aren't guaranteed a job this season. We've got a lot of competition, some of the new ones are getting after the vets, and that can only make us better."

Belnap's veteran element includes the above mentioned four starters plus 6-8 **Dean Hunger**, now a sophomore and a starter once last season; six-foot point guard **Rawlee Perkins**, who started six times last year and who backs Oscar Williams; 6-1 **Steve Pinegar** a very good shooter who lettered, playing in 13 games, and 6-11 returning squadman **Bob Bergstrom**, Mike Santos' practice-time opposition day in and day out.

There are those who feel Belnap's major problem will be finding the most effective blend of the old and the new.

Risking oversimplification, it seemed in the pre-season the most likely new faces to get into the lineup the quickest were 6-3 guard **Keith McDonald** from Santa Rosa JC in California, 6-8 freshman **Brian Jackson** from Palos Verdes, California and 6-2 **Keith Hood**, another freshman and a Pasadena, California product.

McDonald is ticketed by the Aggie coaches as a "number two guard," a shooter with intelligence on the floor to play the big guard spot. Hood, too, falls into that category but can't be ruled out as a contributor at the other

guard slot where Williams and Perkins hold forth.

Santos, on the strength of last year's stats and his always strong performances against the best opposition around, seems to have the middle all to himself. The Aggie coaches don't deny much of the offense is geared to accommodate Santos' expanding talents.

With the play of McDonald and Hood and others, Belnap feels he can afford himself the luxury of putting sometimes guard Martineau at forward, to go with Bailess, Hunger, Jackson, freshman **Gary Furniss**, et al.

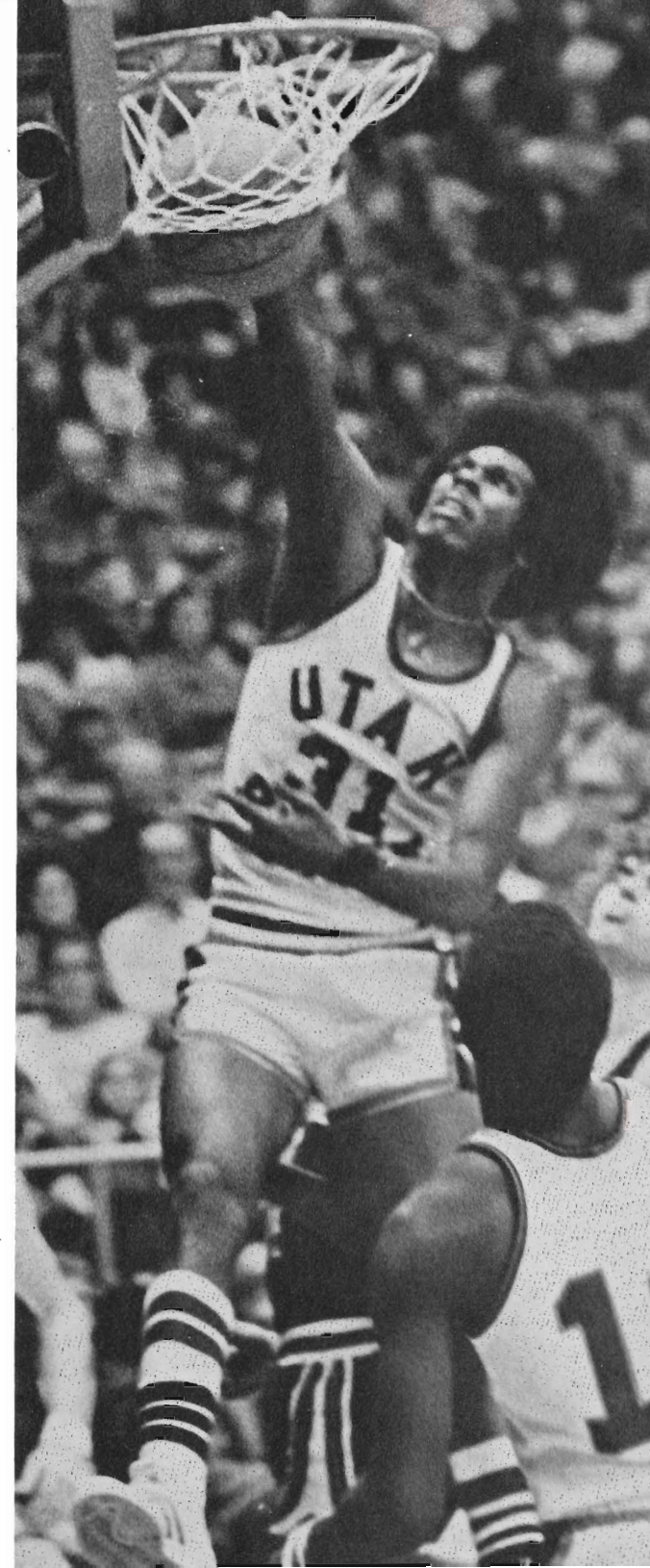
"No question Blair is one of our most intense and hardest working," said Belnap. "But, in a sense, the best thing he may have going for him right now is his ability to help out at either guard or forward."

That seemingly creates more options for Belnap and staff to explore and with the talent on hand, it could find Ags coming at their foes from all kinds of directions.

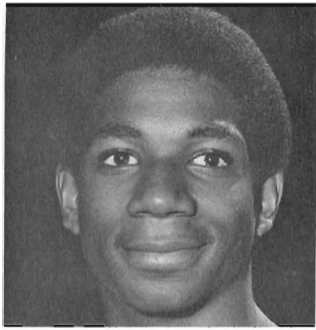
The availability of additional freshmen **Dave McCall** (6-3) and **Russ Hafen** (6-6), both with impressive high school backgrounds, is another indication of the depth apparent among the '77-'78 Ags.

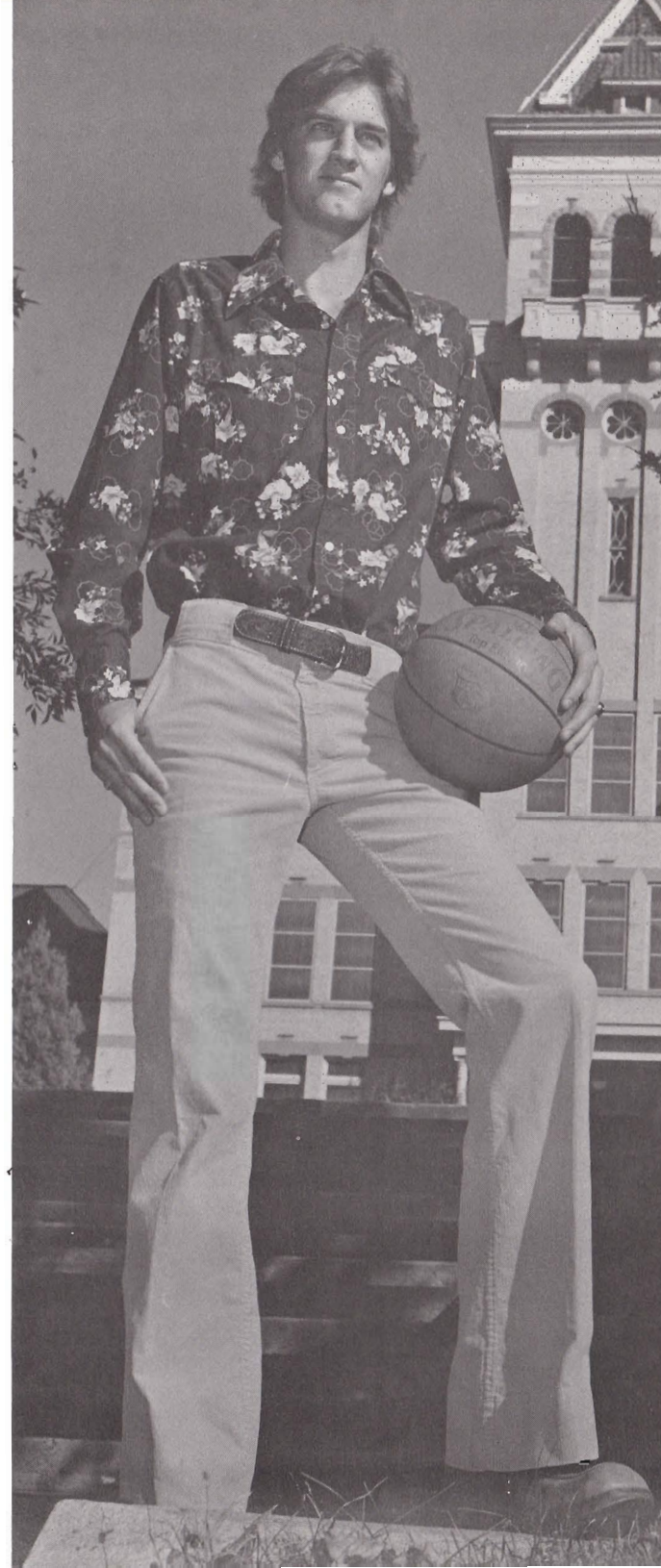


# Preston Bailess

**Forward . . . 6-9 . . . 180 . . . Jr . . . 2VL . . . Corpus Christi, Texas . . . 20 . . . born: 12/11/56 in Houston . . . Range Science major . . .** a starter 34 of his 50 career games in two years at USU, Bailess is an odds-on choice to hold down a first unit job along the baseline again in 1977-78 . . . started 10 of 23 games as a freshman and 24 of 27 last year as a sophomore . . . despite heavy recruiting efforts by several schools in his home state, he left Texas because "... it's all too football oriented" . . . was thrown into the fire suddenly during the 1975-76 season as a frosh when Mike Santos was injured, but he responded well right away with 13, 16 and 10 point performances against Utah, BYU and Colorado State in the span of six days . . . has quick hands and feet and moves fluidly but has tried and failed to keep much more than 180 pounds distributed over his lanky 6-9 frame . . . it was obvious during pre-season drills Bailess is an improved athlete . . . "Preston this year is a much better defender and rebounder," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap. "He displayed much better intensity and aggressiveness on our Australian tour and he may have been the outstanding defensive player in the 19 games we played" . . . he also averaged over nine points and eight rebounds in Australia . . . Belnap sees Bailess' role as a catalyst to team defense while improving his scoring and rebounding figures of the

past . . . with his exposure on the major college level, Bailess' confidence has grown . . . Preston is considered a good medium-range shooter . . . maturity has brought an increase in his physical strength . . . even in face of his improvement and experience, it was obvious Bailess was getting some competition during the pre-season from youngsters Brian Jackson and Gary Furniss . . . that is the sort of depth Dutch Belnap hasn't always been able to count on . . . fifth in scoring (8.1) and second in rebounding (5.3) on last year's 15-12 team, he was one of three regulars in the 50% shooting range (48.5) . . . Preston's career scoring high happened January 29 of last season when he hit nine-of-13 shots for 18 points in the Ags' 103-84 win at home against Stanford . . . he was the team's high scorer once last year, with 16 points in the lopsided win over Boise State . . . Preston was a three-year starter for Mike Kunstadt at Carroll High in Corpus Christi . . . those teams went 32-5, 23-9, 35-3 although Preston's senior season was shortened by an injury . . . in some 95 career games at Carroll he scored 1,313 points and had 916 rebounds . . . son of Benson (Del Mar Junior College Supervisor) and Scotty Bailess . . . mother was a member of the USA national volleyball team in the 1955 Pan Am Games . . . brother Benny (6-7) was a four-year letterman at East Texas Baptist College in Marshall.

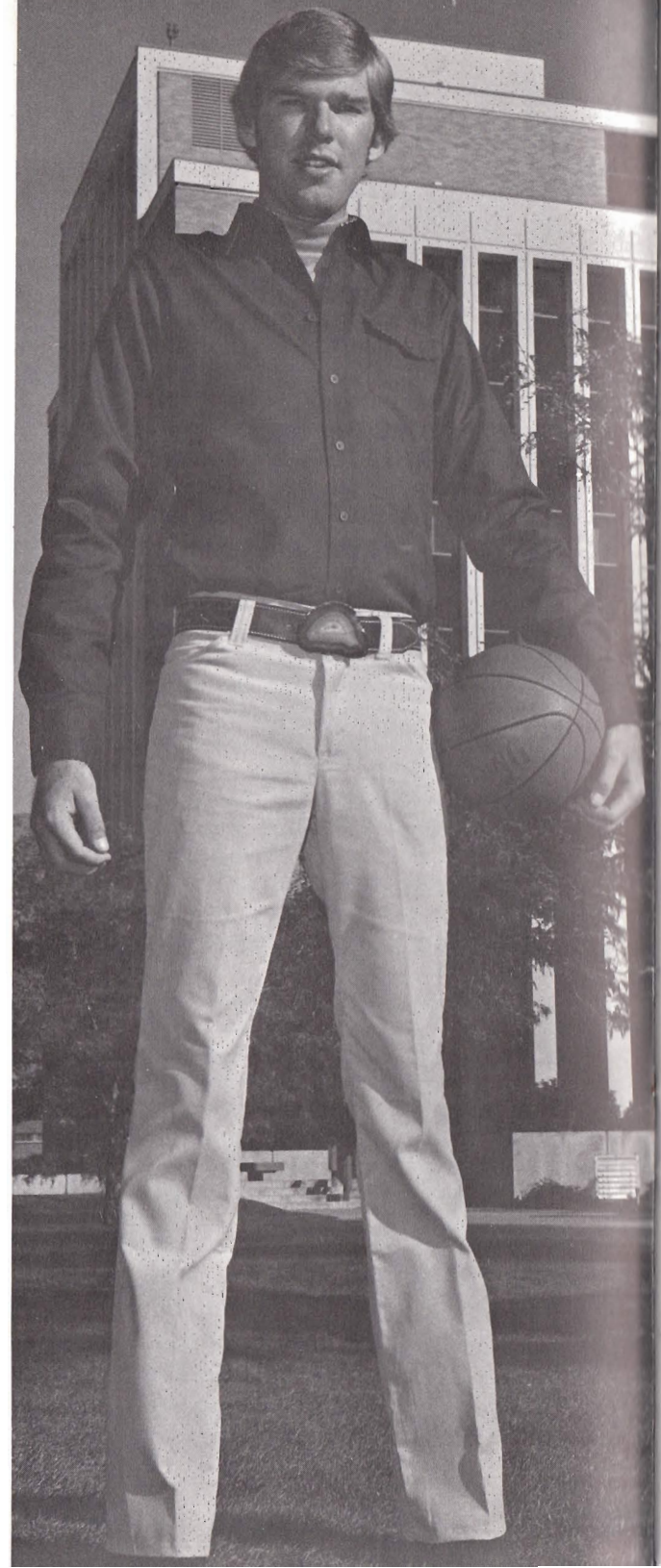
## Bob Bergstrom

**Center . . . 6-11 . . . 210 . . . So . . . 1976-77 squadman . . . Loveland, Colo . . . 20 . . . born: 9/15/57 in Hibbing, Minnesota . . . Industrial Technology major . . .** used primarily as a junior varsity player last year, Bergstrom did appear in nine varsity games . . . his shooting figures for a total of 32 minutes of varsity play were interesting: seven-of-eight from the field for 87.5% . . . he scored six points in the Aggies' 21-point victory over Cal-Bakersfield . . . a starter in each of the 15 JV games he played, Bob averaged 11.4 points and 8.8 rebounds for the 10-9 junior varsity . . . connected on 46.9% of his shots with the JV club and scored a season high 24 against Weber State's junior varsity . . . USU's coaches recognize Bergstrom as an athlete who is making constant improvement and they have cautioned him that time and patience are two qualities he must allow himself to achieve what he wants to in the game . . . as with many of the Ags, the summer tour of Australia was a benefit to Bob . . . scored more than four points and averaged three rebounds a game on the trip . . . onlookers during pre-season drills noticed a more

aggressive, determined Bergstrom . . . has the chance daily to go against one of the nation's best centers: Mike Santos . . . considered a good shooter and decent rebounder, although that latter phase of his game has suffered from inconsistency . . . Bergstrom isn't the first collegiate player to find he's been forced to work much harder to find success on the university level than he did earlier in his basketball career . . . "Right now we feel Bob's biggest hurdle to overcome is simply to not get too discouraged with himself, but to have patience and keep working to improve," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap . . . actually has good quickness and speed for a man 6-11 . . . was a 23.0 points a game scorer and 15.0 rebounder at Loveland High before moving to USU . . . after three years with coach Frank Javernick at Loveland he had totaled 1,216 points, leading the 11-team Northern Conference in scoring as a senior, and he was instrumental in Loveland's 16-3 team of 1975-76 . . . once scored 49 points against Niwot High . . . parents: Robert (construction company owner) and Colleen Bergstrom . . . oldest of three children.

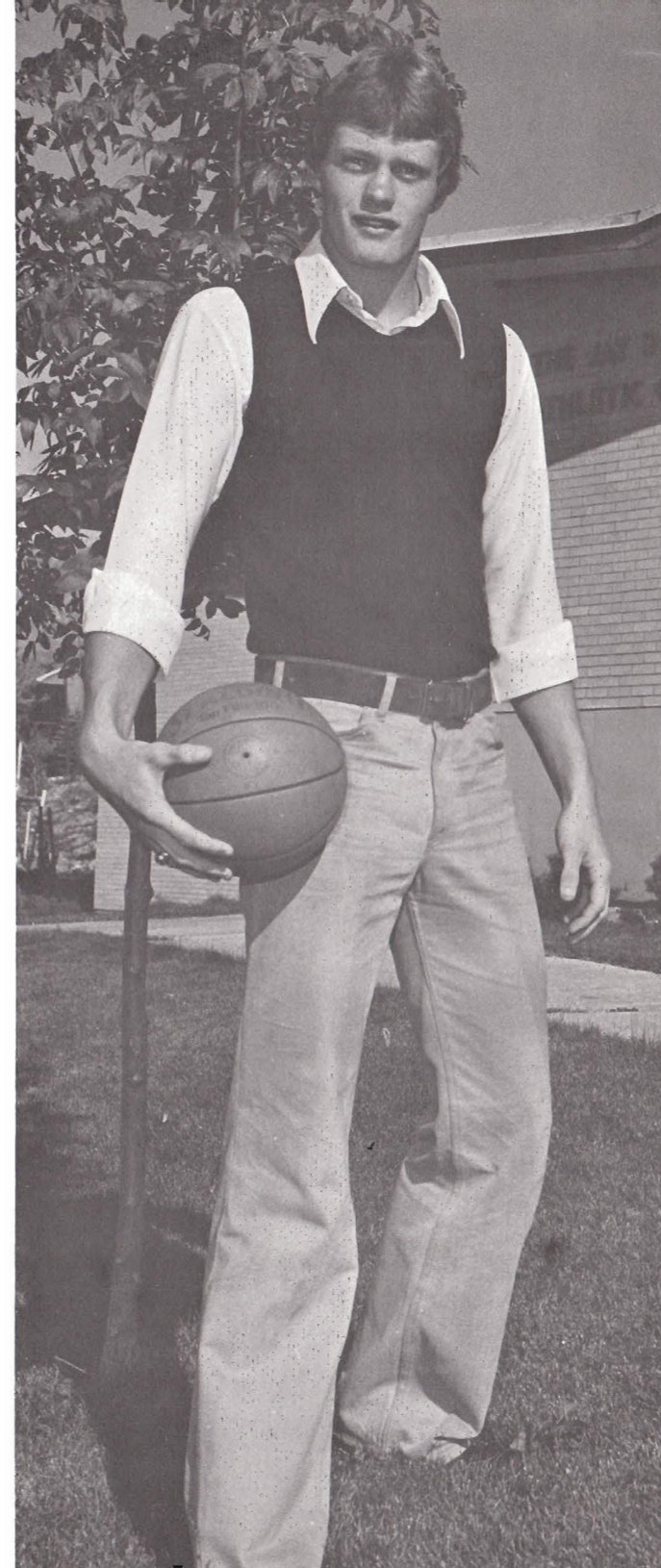




**Forward . . . 6-7 . . . 215 . . . Fr . . . HS . . .**  
**Driggs, Idaho . . . 18 . . . born: 4/15/59 in**  
**Driggs . . . Liberal Studies major . . .** Dutch Belnap called it "one of the most important signings since I've been the head coach here . . ." when Furniss decided in April to attend Utah State . . . Idaho's Player of the Year, for all prep classifications, Furniss had nothing less than a storybook athletic career at Teton High in Driggs . . . he was a three year starter for a basketball team which won 68 straight games and three straight state titles . . . he scored 1,501 career points and grabbed 1,330 rebounds, 19.0 and 16.8 career averages . . . Les Wade's Redskins teams were 25-2, 26-0 and 27-0 with Furniss as a starter . . . last season, while running up a record which many said qualified him as one of the country's top high schoolers, he averaged 20.4 points and 20.5 rebounds . . . and that for a school of 270 students . . . he once blocked 14 shots in a game and his scoring and rebounding highs were 39 and 30 . . . "He's really a diamond in the rough. Obviously he has all the credentials and he can become one of our finer forwards at

USU. He's strong, has a big heart and he's a very coachable young man," said Dutch Belnap . . . obviously one of Furniss' biggest challenges on the major college level will be the adjustment to much bigger, swifter and generally better competition . . . he handled that change well during pre-season drills, however, as the best his teammates could throw at him forced Gary to do his best . . . otherwise easygoing and unassuming, he shows a locked in intensity while on the floor . . . has a tremendous attitude toward collegiate athletics and a strong will to excel . . . some phases of his game may not be perfected overnight but it was obvious during pre-season drills his rebounding skills on this Aggie team take a backseat to Mike Santos, but likely no one else. . . has spent a great deal of time learning to adjust his shooting to avoid the "rejectors" he'll face in college basketball . . . has limitless strength and could seemingly run and jump all night . . . plays a lot of the game above the rim . . . rates 100+ on the character scale . . . youngest of seven kids, Gary has three brothers who are 6-5, 6-6 and 6-7 . . . son of Ervin and Lola Furniss.





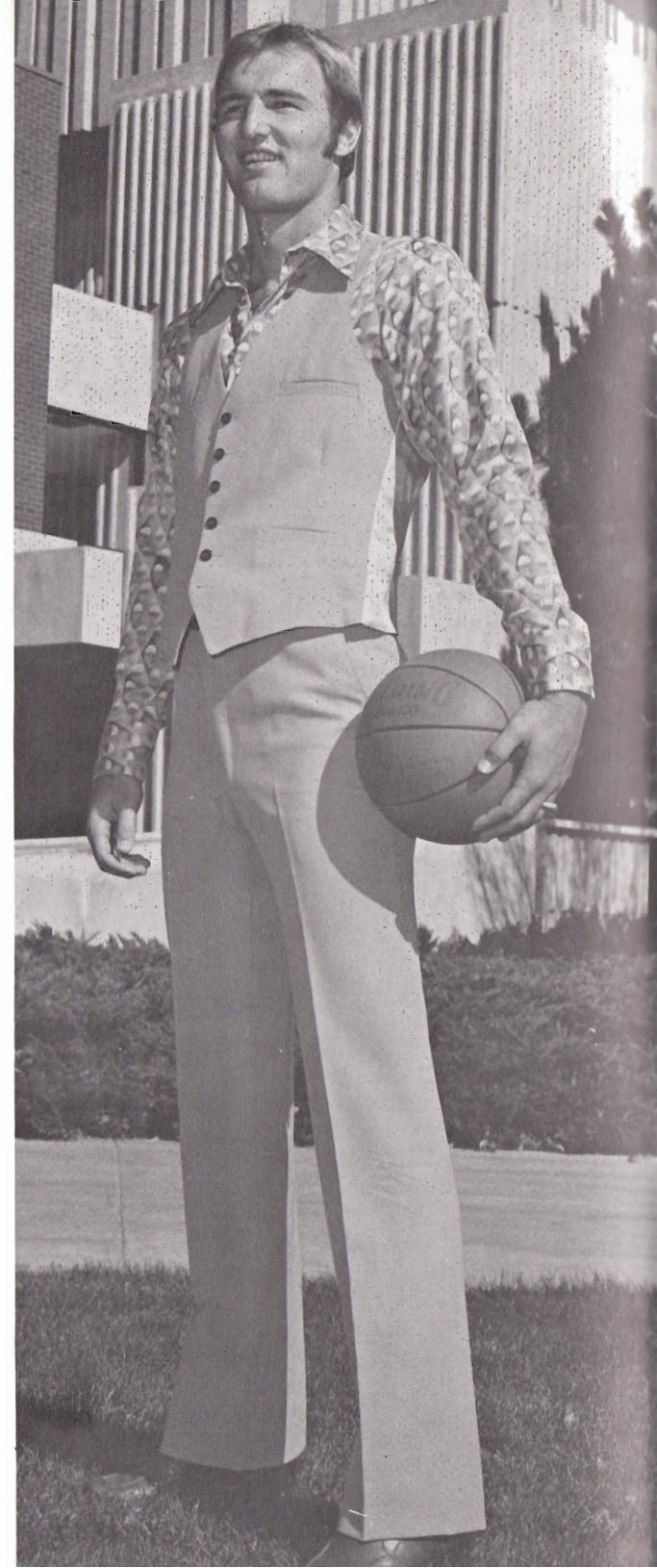

**Forward . . . 6-6 . . . 205 . . . Fr . . . HS . . . Boulder City, Nevada . . . 18 . . . born: 6/12/59 in St. George, Utah . . . Liberal Studies major . . .** here's a product of David Shay's program at Boulder City High who was one of those do-it-all athletes as a prep . . . a superb hurdler and jumper as a trackman and quarterback in football, he was well known throughout Nevada as a 20.0 points a game postman in basketball . . . also averaged 14.0 rebounds a contest . . . "Russ is an extremely good shooter and passer who must make the center-to-forward transition to play on the major college level, but we don't expect it to be a big problem for him," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap . . . displayed an intelligent court sense during pre-season drills, with a fine ability to see the open man and deliver the ball . . . it is expected Hafen will be available to play with the junior varsity team from time to time and that will be an advantage to him in gaining the type of collegiate experience that comes only through game time . . . similar to current freshman teammate Gary Furniss, Hafen is a product of a smaller high school athletic program and has found himself adjusting to conditions created when everybody on the floor is as big, or bigger . . . "It might be like shooting baskets in a Volkswagen," is Dutch Belnap's description of the high school-to-major college transition many

athletes experience . . . "It's a big mental adjustment, it's really like starting all over again, and it's a challenge for a young man," said Belnap . . . obviously the most valuable player last year at Boulder City High, he paced the basketball team to a state title and a 24-3 record . . . following the season he became the first athlete in the school's history to have a jersey retired . . . showed in the pre-season he is hard-nosed, intelligent and a good shooter from 15 to 18 feet . . . reminds some of 1973-75 Aggie standout Rich Haws . . . last year's Ags made a 19-game tour of Australia and although incoming freshmen were not allowed to make the trip, it didn't matter to Hafen . . . Russ's Boulder City High team took part in a Bi-Centennial tour of Australia during the summer of 1976 . . . Hafen was also a member of the AAU Last Vegas All Stars which played in two Junior Olympic Tournaments and made trips to West Virginia, New York, Cincinnati, Denver and other closer cities . . . a split end, Russ was twice named to the Nevada all-state football team . . . an all-state basketballer for three years running, he was the MVP in the two most recent Nevada state tournaments and led Boulder City to two straight state crowns . . . son of Sherman and Mary Louise Hafen . . . father is a school teacher.



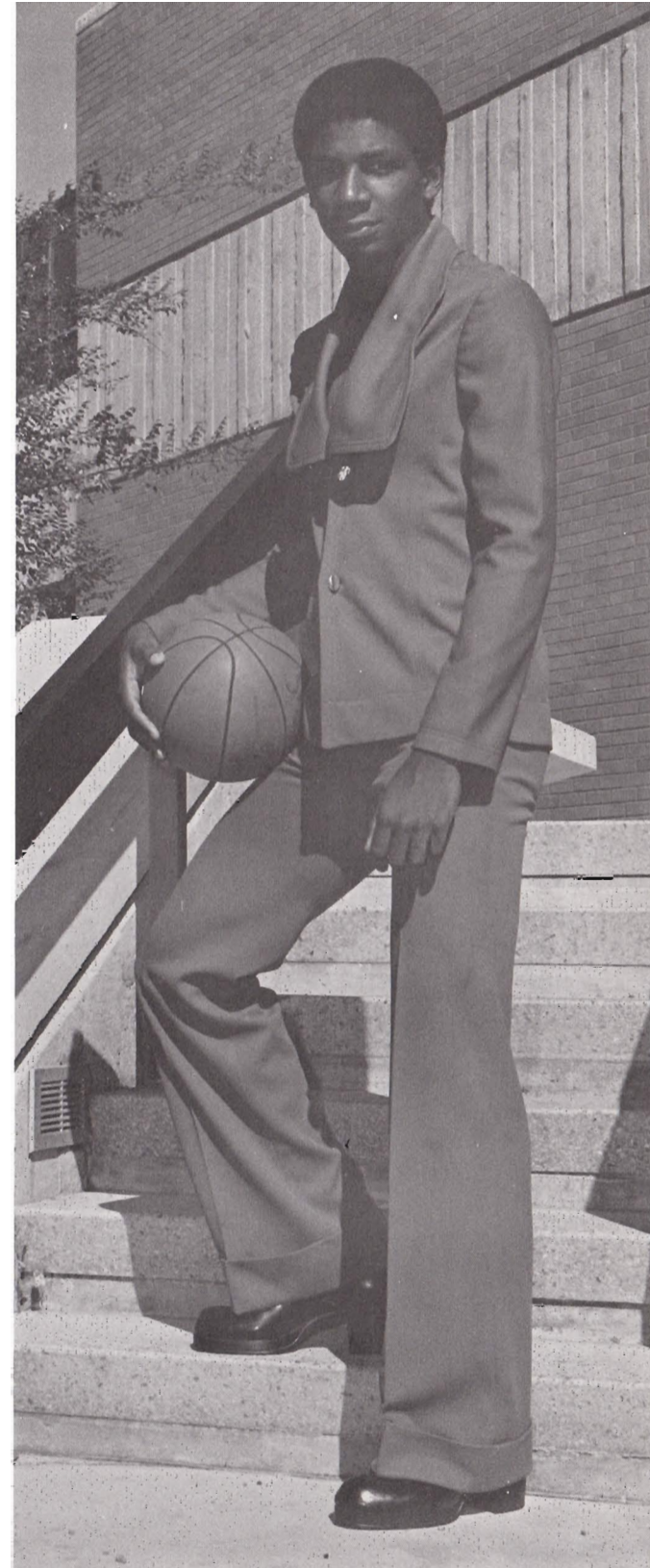

**Guard . . . 6-2 . . . 190 . . . Fr. . . HS . . . Pasadena, Calif . . . 18 . . . born: 7/4/59 in Los Angeles . . . Animal Science major . . .** not what might be considered the prototype July 4 baby, this new Aggie freshman guard brings a personality of modesty, restraint and deportment to the USU program . . . however, any flamboyance in his makeup becomes quickly evident when he takes to the floor . . . a smooth-moving, hard-working, self-motivated athlete who seems typical of the new freshmen in the Aggie program this year: not easily intimidated . . . "He's one of the better freshman guards I've seen since I've been here," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap. "Keith worked as hard as anybody in the program during pre-season drills. Upperclassmen don't bother this guy. But he's not loud, he is a deep, quiet person. He's certainly more a doer than a talker." . . . extremely strong with very good jumping ability, Hood proved himself to be a good medium distance shooter right away in the Aggie camp . . . a mentally tough person . . . positive and aggressive in his approach to the game . . . those close to the program expect the years to come will prove Hood to be one of the most solid guards in many seasons at USU . . . comes from an excellent coaching background . . . played for George Terzian and was the floor general for Pasadena High's 4A state championship team in California . . . finished the season 29-2 and

beat Long Beach Poly in the title game, and that earned Pasadena a ninth place ranking nationally on one high school poll . . . playing for a high school of 5,000 students, Hood averaged 15.6 points a game and won all-CIF second team honors . . . actually brought a reputation with him as a strong defensive player but he's no slouch with the ball, either . . . at Pasadena Keith shared the limelight with teammate Barry Brooks, a 6-6 guard now at USC . . . experts considered the Hood-Brooks backcourt one of the three best guardline combinations in all of American high school basketball . . . as a freshman at Pasadena High, Keith confided in those close to him that by the time he was a senior, Pasadena would become the first team in the school's history to win the CIF championship, and they did . . . Hood was unable to make the Australian tour last summer with the Aggies, due to an NCAA rule which did not allow incoming freshmen to participate, but by then he was already a world traveler . . . early at Pasadena High, Keith played for a team coached by Bill Duwe which represented the United States in the International Schoolsport Federation World High School tournament in Barcelona, Spain . . . born exactly one day before another Aggie freshman, guard Dave McCall of San Francisco . . . son of Edward and Diana Hood.



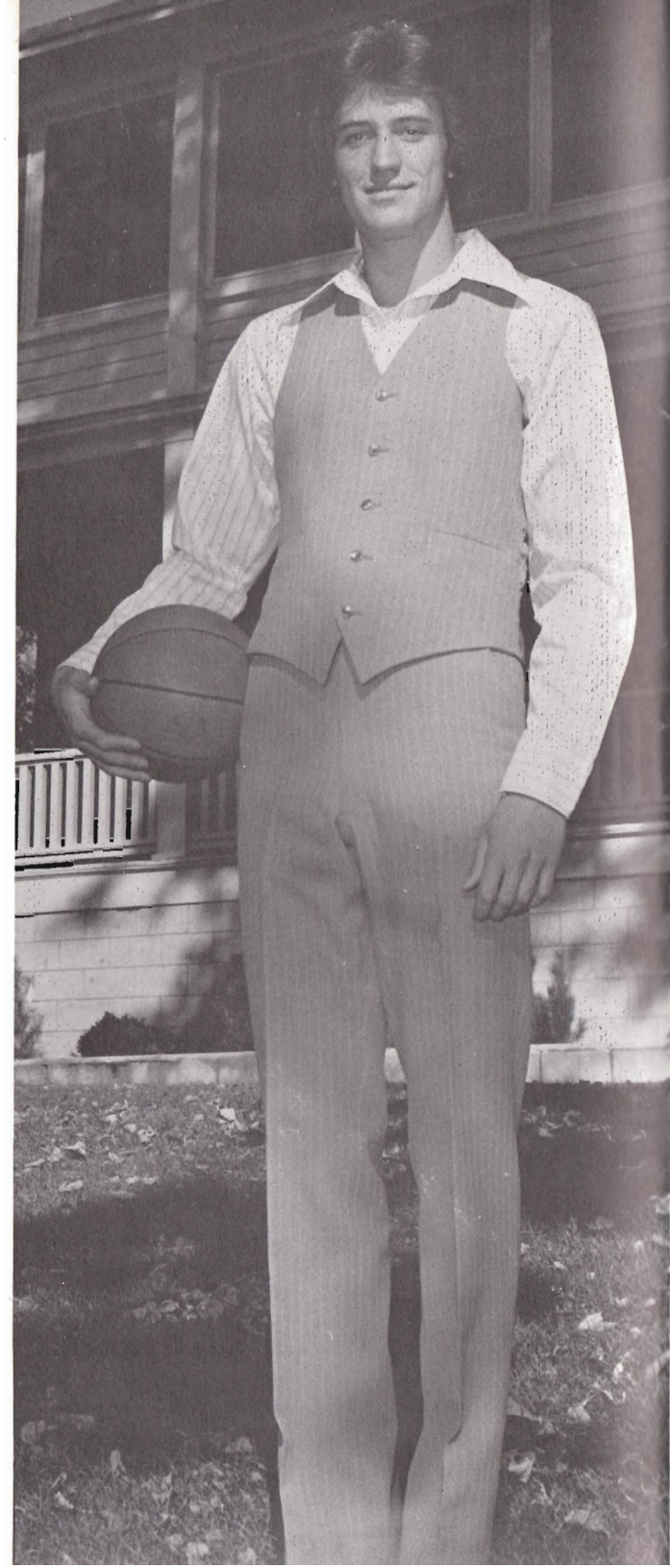


# Dean Hunger

**Forward-Center . . . 6-8 . . . 210 . . . So . . . 1VL . . . Kaysville, Utah . . . 18 . . . born: 11/30/58 in Provo . . . major course of study undecided . . .** the "fine wine" of USU's basketball program, Hunger gets better with age . . . it surprises some to reflect that Hunger is just a sophomore, his demeanor and his freshman year accomplishments create an aura of upperclassman maturity about him . . . was USU's freshman athlete of the year last season . . . appearing in 23 games and starting one (Cal-Bakersfield) Hunger made fine progress during an uncommon freshman season . . . he wound up sixth in scoring (7.3), shot 50.7% and scored a personal high of 17 three times (Weber State, Stanford and Santa Barbara) . . . those three games were bunched in late-January, early-February and in them his cumulative shooting total was 18-of-27 (66.7%) . . . his 16 points were tops on the Aggie team during the early-January game against Idaho State . . . averaged just under four rebounds a game during the season and had a season high of 10 against the Air Force Academy . . . a very good free throw shooter last year (30-of-37, .811) . . . technically, Hunger led last year's JV team in scoring, averaging 21.2 points a game, but he made just four appearances with them . . . youngest sophomore on the team . . . "We felt Dino was probably our next most consistent athlete on the Australian trip, to Santos," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap. "His consistency may be his most

impressive characteristic. He's always improving, he's a good medium distance shooter and he can be valuable to us at forward or center. He subbed for 'Booney' (Santos) on the Australian tour." . . . played in all 19 games in Australia and his 17.6 scoring average was second to Santos' 21.8 . . . also averaged 7.4 rebounds and shot 57% . . . threw in a last-second shot to beat St. Kilda, possibly the team's biggest win in Australia . . . ex-Marquette coach Al McGuire would call it all "seashells and balloons" for the Ags the next three years with Hunger available during that time . . . Dean distinguished himself as a baseball-basketball great at Davis High, helping Mike Gardner's team pile up a 41-12 record in two years as a starter . . . his senior totals were impressive enough: 19.7 points, 12.0 rebounds, shooting figures of 56% and 85% . . . Davis was 25-4 Hunger's junior year and captured the state title . . . called the state's best senior big man by Aggie coaches . . . with current Aggie teammate Steve Pinegar, he played for the Utah all-stars in the Utah-Arizona prep game . . . quickly becoming an expert baseline player, he knows his way around and through the traffic under the basket . . . of German descent, Dean is the son of an Air Force man and has lived in Louisiana, Virginia, Spain . . . second oldest of four children . . . sister, Nancy, also attends USU . . . parents: F. Dean and Helen Hunger.

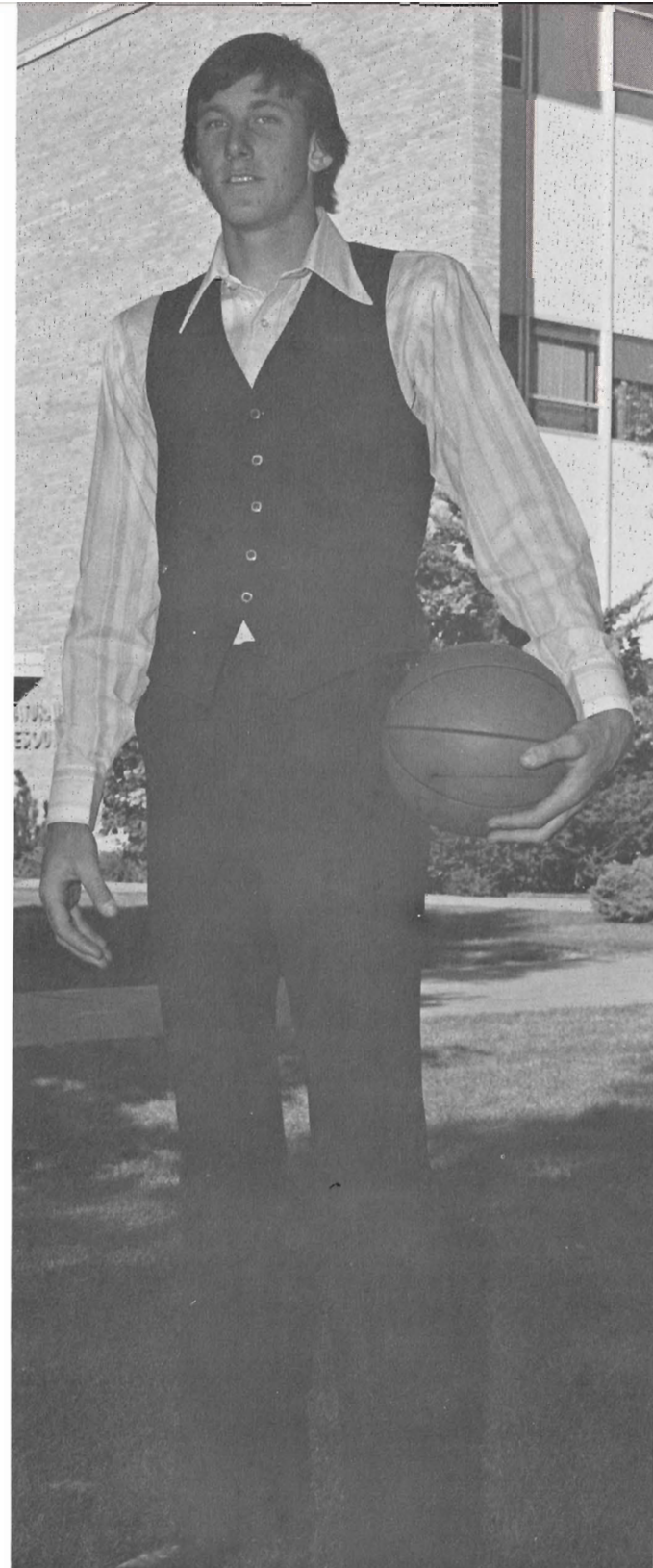

**Forward-Center . . . 6-8 . . . 200 . . . Fr . . . HS . . . Los Angeles, Calif . . . 17 . . . born: 2/1/59 in Los Angeles . . . major course of study undecided . . .** while he is generally pleased with the play of every one of his six new recruits, many have observed Dutch Belnap particularly taken with the accomplishments of this rawboned freshman during pre-season drills . . . during pre-season drills Brian seemed very sure of himself on the major college level . . . it became obvious right away his contributions in '77-'78 will be considerable . . . a rugged athlete, he displays center-type inside aggressiveness and he could help in spelling Mike Santos, although majority of his time should come at forward . . . an athlete well versed in the fundamentals, his defensive play is sound, and determined . . . declined recruiting visits to several other schools . . . selected one of California's top 12 high schoolers last year, Jackson hasn't rested on those laurels at USU . . . "Brian hasn't lacked confidence, he loves the challenge of major college basketball and he wants very badly to play," said Belnap. "He comes from John Mihaljevich's program at Palos Verdes High and is considered, with Jan Van Breda Kolff, one of the best forwards the school ever had."

. . . averaged 21 points and almost 15 rebounds a game for a 19-9 Palos Verdes team . . . selected all-CIF . . . not only a good medium-range shooter, Jackson handles himself well in traffic and belies his size with a strong ability to drive with the ball to the hoop . . . his approach to the game is a coach's dream: he says little, takes coaching well and battles until they put the balls on the rack . . . there was little doubt during pre-season drills he was breathing down the necks of veterans like Preston Bailess and Dean Hunger . . . a skiing, backpacking enthusiast, there is little question the northern Utah mountains helped in the recruitment of Jackson . . . as a high school freshman, Jackson was more at home with a surfboard than a backboard . . . a freshman coach, Brian Gauthier, did some fast talking before Jackson made the team and has since made the game a big part of his life . . . during his pre years Jackson became interested in ranch life and he's since become a proficient cowboy, working regularly at a ranch in Bakersfield . . . family members say Brian's background information wouldn't be complete without mention of Stefan Hurwicz, a friend since second grade who is also a freshman at USU . . . parents: Donivan and Ruth.





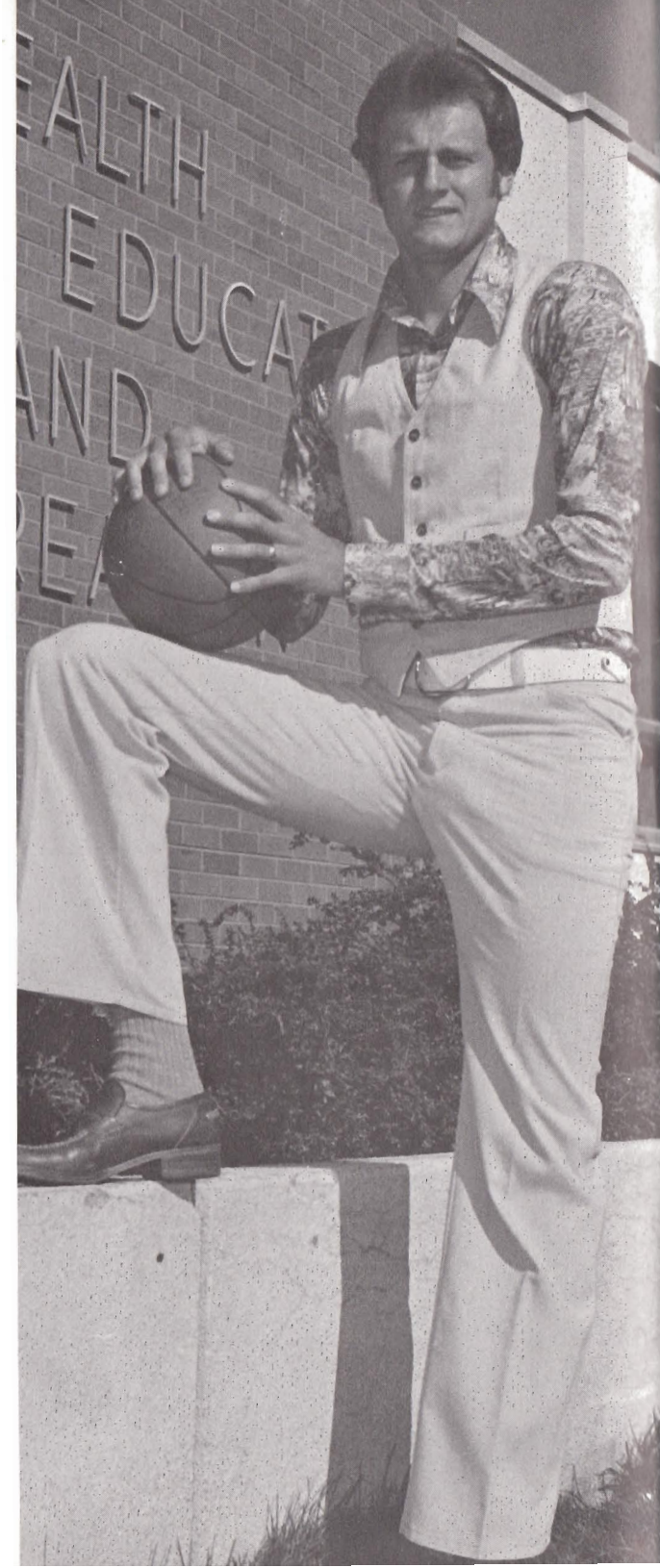
# Blair Martineau

**Forward-Guard . . . 6-5 . . . 190 . . . Sr . . . 2VL . . . Midvale, Utah . . . 22 . . . born: 3/20/55 in Salt Lake City . . . Physical Education major . . .** at 22, Martineau is the eldest of the Aggies and, with fellow seniors Oscar Williams and Mike Santos, lends the crucial element of experience to a team which has a combined freshman-sophomore representation greater than the total of juniors and seniors . . . long recognized as a strong defensive player . . . it may be realistic to expect Martineau to be more effective at forward than at guard in 1977-78 . . . a 50.4% career shooter, Blair has started 29 of his 53 games at Utah State . . . "Blair's intensity and aggressiveness are well known to our fans," said Dutch Belnap, "but his biggest asset may be his ability to play both positions." . . . was third in scoring (16.6) on the Australian trip while shooting 60% . . . the team's second leading scorer last year (14.3), Blair had a moderate start last season as a junior before scoring a personal career high of 28 against Utah and 28 against BYU within the span of three games . . . a good shooter, he hit 70% of his shots in those games . . . active enough to fill the lane on a break, and to dribble drive through traffic to the hoop . . . hit 57% of his shots the last 17 games last year . . . after playing in 22 games during the most

recent season the Ags sent a team into post-season play (1974-75), Martineau won a first unit job as 1975-76 began . . . however, he injured his wrist in the opener that year (it was later found to be broken after three more games) and that cancelled the entire year for him . . . Blair is playing this year under the five-to-play-four years rule; in other words he was redshirted during 1975-76 . . . however, an NCAA ruling (as yet unchanged in late-November) directed Martineau be held out of post-season play his final year due to the extra games he played at the beginning of 1975-76 . . . there is little question much of Blair's success in major college basketball is the result of his boundless intensity and aggressiveness . . . an extremely hard worker who is all business during practices and games . . . once a 6-8 high jumper for the Aggie track and field team . . . Martineau was the surprise development of the 16-4 JV club of 1973-74 . . . he was second in scoring (15.4) and rebounding (6.9) that year and had six 20-point games . . . played for Gary Mose at Lake Stevens (Washington) High School and later for Art Hughes at Hillcrest in Salt Lake City as the Huskies were sixth in the state that 1972-73 season . . . married June 25, 1976 to the former Chris Meyer . . . son of G. Grant and Myrna Martineau.

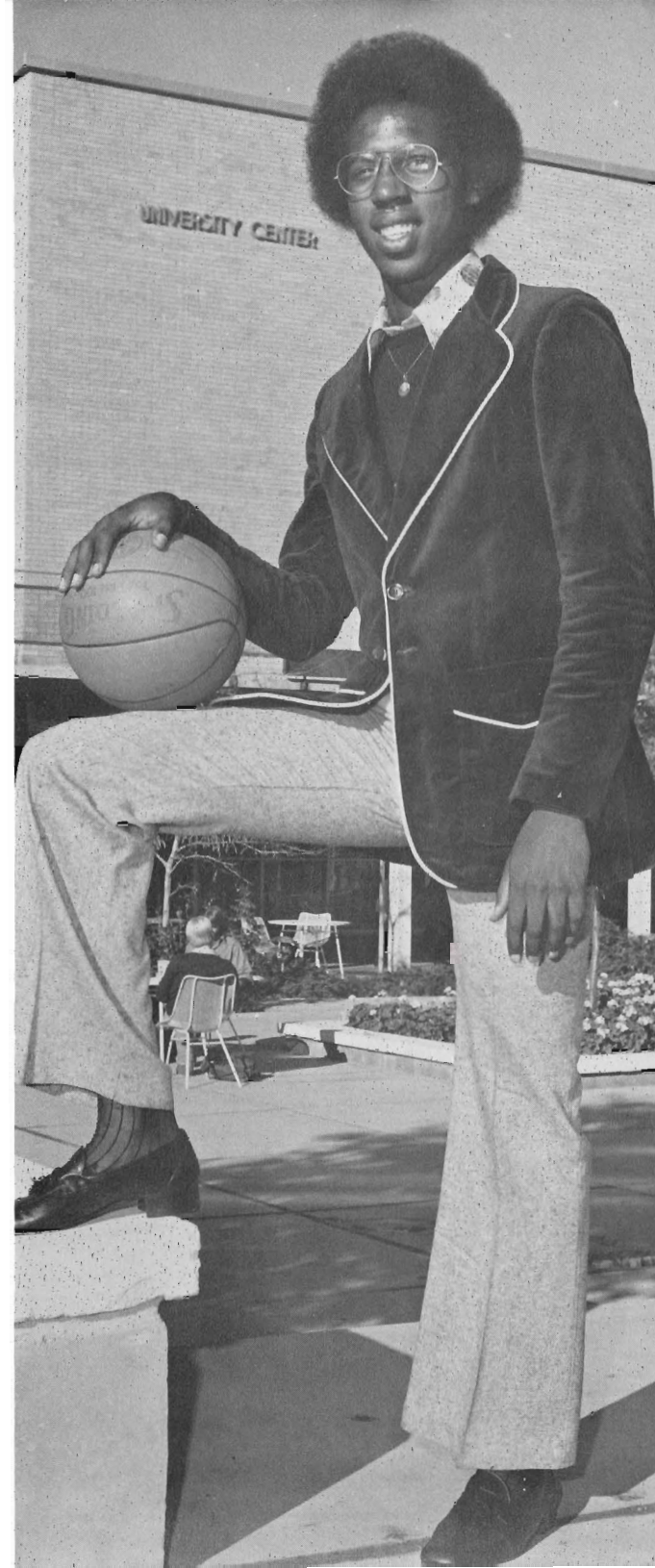

Dave's 78 points leave him sixth on the alltime TOC list, better than the figure current Golden State Warriors star Phil Smith scored . . . last year Mission played in four tournaments and McCall was MVP in three of them and on the all-tournament teams of each . . . once picked up the nickname "Radar" . . . was considered the quarterback of Mission High's teams, although he scored 490 points last year in 24 games . . . recruiters from Santa Clara, UCLA, Arizona State and other schools expressed an interest in Dave before he decided on Utah State to further his education . . . prospects are good he could become one of USU's best shooters, if improvement continues during the next year or two . . . third of six children . . . mother is a library technician . . . son of Shirley McCall.



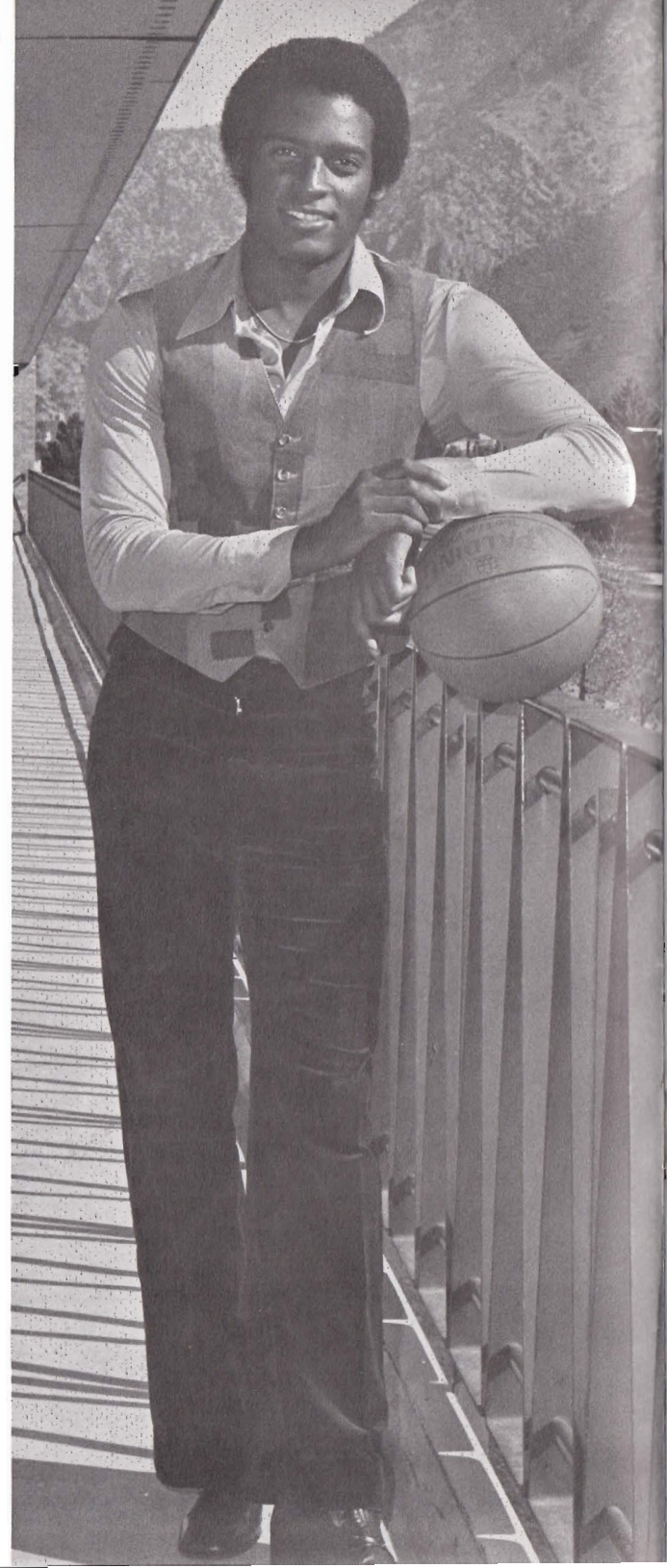

**Guard . . . 6-3 . . . 190 . . . Jr . . . JC Transfer . . . Oakland, Calif . . . 20 . . . born: 6/20/57 in Oakland . . . Health major . . .** only Aggie on the 1977-78 roster with junior college experience . . . good-sized guard with "smarts" who brings good experience from top-flight JC basketball into the USU program . . . last year played for highly respected Bill Trumbo, Head Coach at Santa Rosa (Calif.) JC . . . with his background in what has long been recognized as Trumbo's team oriented concept of the game, he should fit quickly into the Aggie scheme . . . when Aggie coaches talk of using Blair Martineau more exclusively at forward, it's nice to know McDonald is immediately available at guard . . . Keith really pushed Martineau for a starting job anyway . . . reputedly a strong defensive guard, he displayed strength and intelligence with the ball, too, during the pre-season . . . is expected to be an immediate contributor to the big guard, or "number two" guard spot opposite point guards like Oscar Williams, Rawlee Perkins, etc . . . handles the ball well and drives with the authority and abandon of a seasoned major college veteran . . . seems to have a sixth sense when it comes to defensive play; he anticipates opponents' passes and

offensive movement very well . . . obviously a good shooter from 17 feet on in . . . a two times all-conference player in JC, he spent his first year at Laney JC, another Bay Area College . . . last year Santa Rosa was 29-4 and won the Camino Norte league . . . may have an advantage over some other college guards in that he's played that position, and that position only, all his organized basketball career . . . (some, of the 6-3 to 6-5 category, are high school centers or forwards who have to make an adjustment to major college backcourt play) . . . obviously a power guard type, he averaged 21.1 points last year at Santa Rosa . . . played for coach Leo Allamanno at Fremont High where he averaged 18 points a game for a 20-4 team . . . was one of just three athletes in the past quarter century to play varsity basketball for three years at Fremont . . . Fremont played in five tournaments during "Mac's" final two years and he was all-tourney five times . . . McDonald led Fremont to an overtime win over Bill Cartwright's Elk Grove club when the seven-foot Cartwright was assigned to guard point guard McDonald, and Mac drove past Cartwright to score and give Fremont its first lead, late in the game . . . son of Callie and Gustavia McDonald.



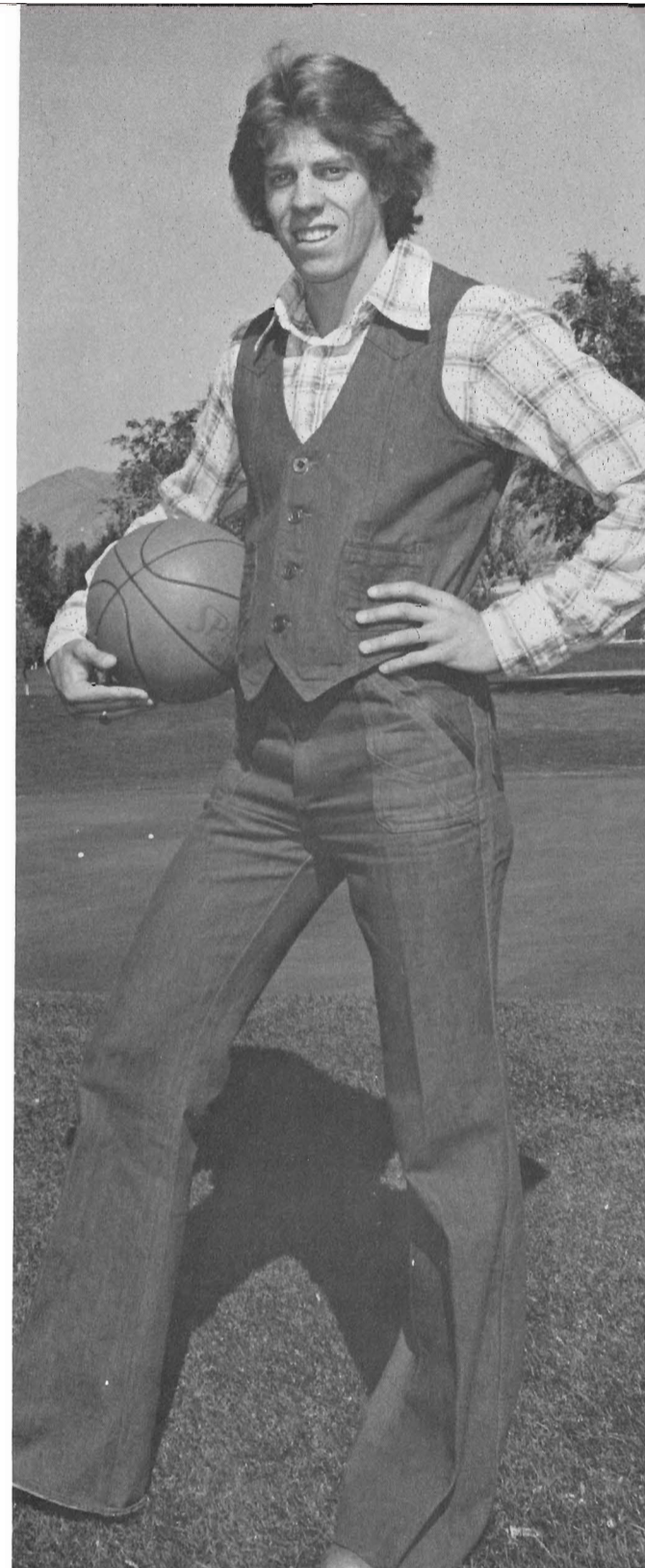


# Rawlee Perkins

**Guard . . . 6-0 . . . 160 . . . Jr . . . 1VL . . . Bountiful, Utah . . . 21 . . . born: 8/13/56 in Salt Lake City . . . Communications major whose career goal is to be a broadcaster . . .** unless he's capable of something more spectacular, letterman guard Rawlee Perkins may be remembered by Aggie fans for years to come as the guy who won the 1976-77 opener against CSU with a 25-foot jumper at the buzzer . . . "If effort and desire were money, he'd have a million," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap. "Rawlee's attitude and approach to the game are excellent and I don't see how he won't be an important key to our success this year." . . . like Oscar Williams, the senior, Rawlee is a point guard in the Aggie system charged primarily with handling the ball and penetrating, both of which he does well . . . his most important asset is immediately visible in practices and games: quickness; he's likely the Ags' quickest athlete . . . would be considered the Aggies' sixth man after his play last year, yet he started against Cal-Bakersfield, Cal-Northridge, Denver, Stanford, Cal-Stanislaus and in the second Weber State game . . . averaged 13

minutes of action in 26 games, yet he was still second to Williams in assists with 59 . . . winner of the "Hustle" award at last year's basketball honors banquet, Rawlee was at his finest (offensively) against Northridge when he scored 12 (five-of-eight from the field) and collected 10 assists in USU's 74-63 win . . . twice selected to all-state mention while at Bountiful High under Joe Johnson . . . scored 18.0 points a game as a senior for a team which had a 15-5 record at Bountiful . . . a lefty, Rawlee appeared in 33 varsity games in two years at USU but most of his freshman season (1975-76) was spent with the JV team . . . that year he scored 14.3 points a game for the JVs, shot almost 49% for the season and had an impressive 25 against the BYU junior varsity . . . has been picking up experience in his chosen field, too, having spent the past two football seasons as a member of the broadcasting crew which originates USU football games . . . the third of four children of Don (Bountiful High Principal) and Donna Perkins . . . Rawlee's dad once coached at Bountiful High.

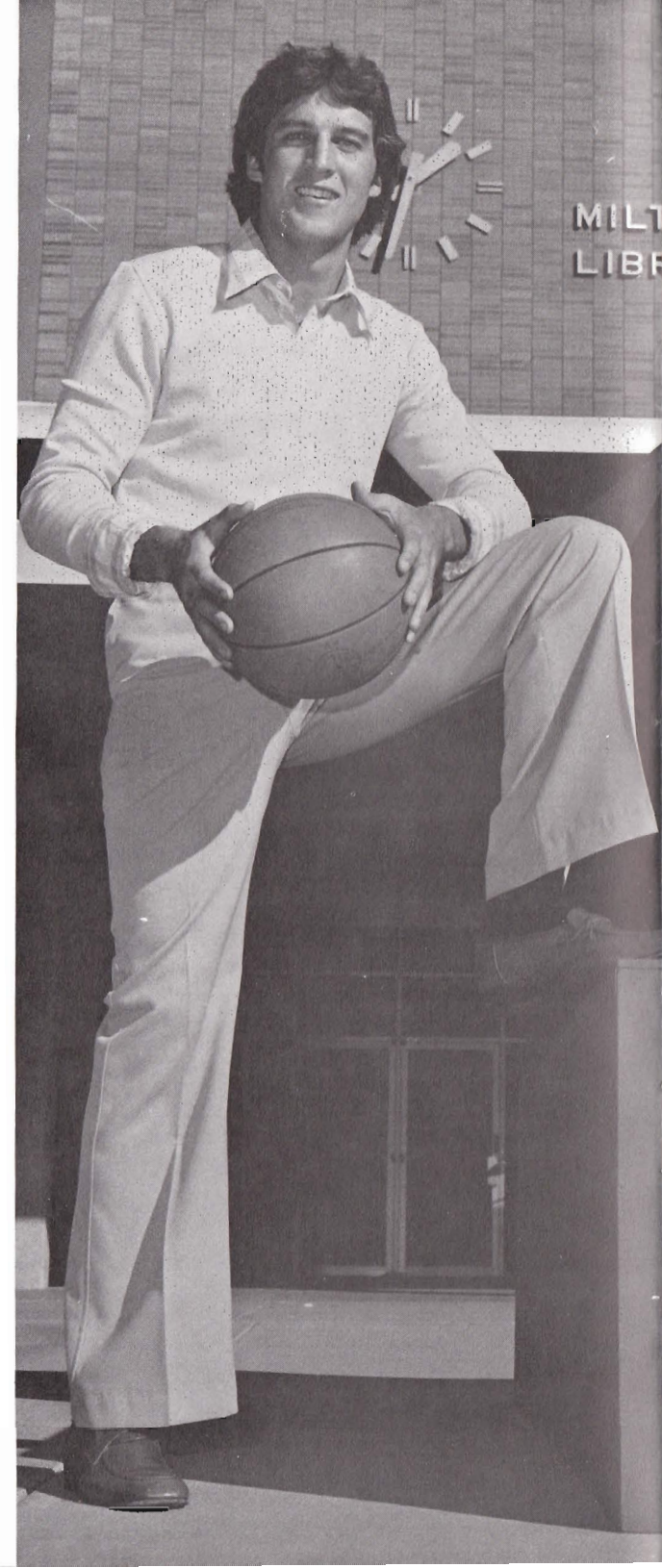
## Steve Pinegar

**Guard . . . 6-1 . . . 175 . . . So . . . 1VL . . . Provo, Utah . . . 19 . . . born: 12/20/57 in Los Angeles, Calif . . . Pre-Dental major who plans to attend dental school . . .** an entrant in 13 varsity and seven JV games of a year ago, Pinegar returns with the same outstanding shooting ability that made him one of the state's top high school guards for two years . . . it was evident from his pre-season progress he worked as hard or harder than any of the Aggies . . . "Steve was in the best shape of his life during the pre-season drills," said Head Coach Dutch Belnap, "and he could be a definite factor in helping this team." . . . his own maturity and continued overall development will determine what his role will be in 1977-78 and how effectively he can fill it . . . his offensive skills were never in doubt when he scored 11 points in 12 minutes during a mid-season game last year against Cal-Bakersfield . . . he averaged 20.1 points in seven JV appearances . . . one of those was

(Provo Dentist) and Patricia Pinegar.

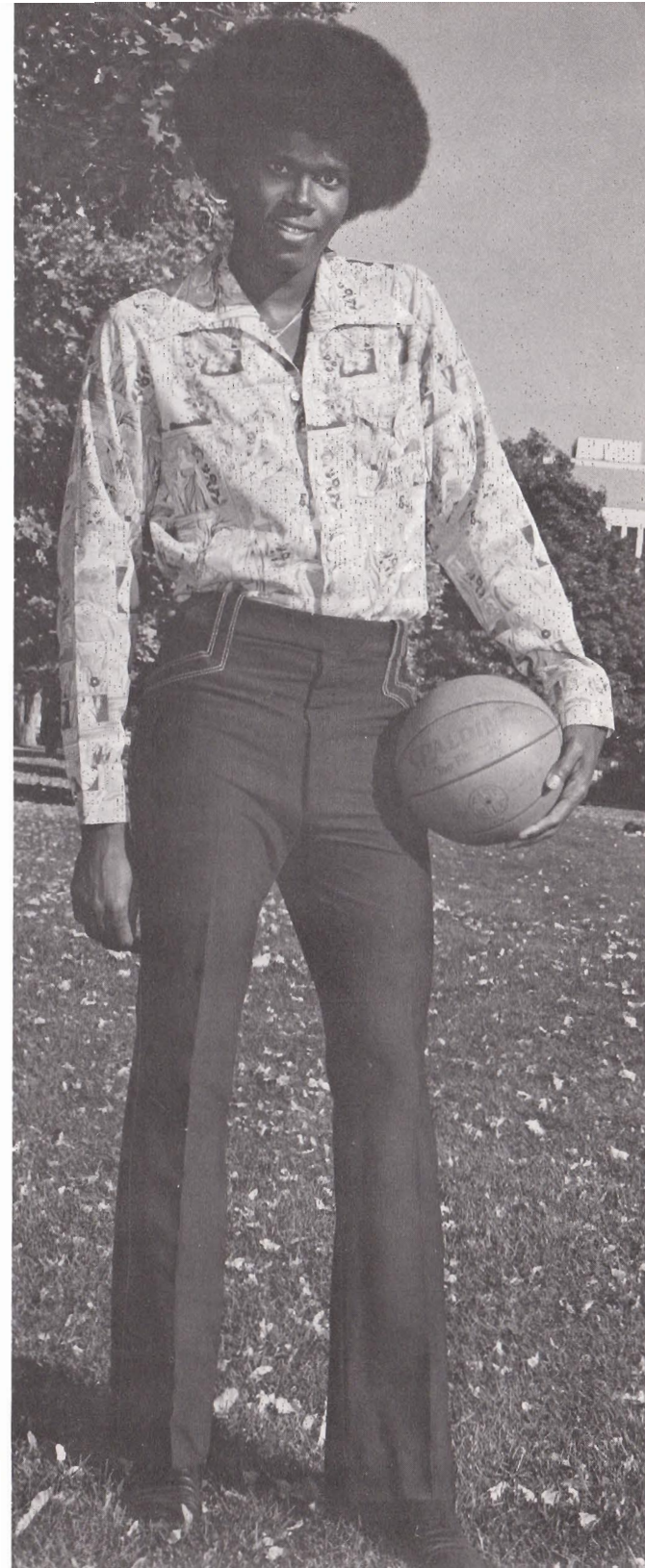


# Mike Santos

**Center . . . 6-8 . . . 225 . . . Sr . . . 3VL . . . Los Angeles, Calif . . . 21 . . . born: 7/17/56 in Chicago, Ill . . . Political Science Major . . .** 1977-78 could be a very interesting year for the Ags, and for Santos, USU's MVP last season . . . after 67 career games over three years (43 as a starter) "Booney" is USU's all-America candidate . . . "We think Mike should prove true all the things other coaches have said about him," said Dutch Belnap. "We think he's the best center in the intermountain area and among the top ones nationally. Mike and I have talked and we both agree improvement in his game is his personal key to success this year, and of course that will have much to do with our success as a team." . . . improvement has been the hallmark of Santos' three years in Logan, he has become noticeably more talented because he works at it . . . it has become a characteristic of his play that the best centers in the country evoke the best from Santos . . . while being named to the Indiana Classic's all tournament team and shattering the Classic rebounding record last December, he outplayed the Hoosier's Kent Benson (19 points, 13 rebounds to 16 points, 11 rebounds) . . . he played on even terms in the same Indiana Classic with Texas Tech's great Mike Russell (27-13 to 28-14) and during the season he outplayed UCLA's David Greenwood (30-12 to 10-11), Washington's

seven-foot James Edwards now of the Lakers (20-11 to 14-8) and Arizona State's Mark Landsberger (27-10 to 11-12) . . . his 22 rebounds in USU's big Portland State win tied Bob Lauriski's Spectrum record . . . his 30 points against UCLA are a career high . . . as might be expected he was the leading scorer (21.8) and rebounder (10.4) during the Ags' 18-1 Australian tour last summer . . . led the 1976-77 Ags in scoring (18.2), rebounding (11.3) and shooting (.532) . . . the latter figure is the sixth best one-season shooting mark on the Aggie books . . . a 49% career shooter, Santos has scored 775 points and collected 503 rebounds in his career . . . needs 225 points to become the 16th Aggie to score 1,000 . . . with a season similar to last year, he will become the school's fourth alltime scorer and rebounder . . . starts the season in 12th place on the career rebounding list . . . his personal stats were affected by a broken foot which kept him from eight games and slowed him in many others as a sophomore . . . quick, smooth, changes ends of the floor well . . . before enrolling at USU prior to the 1974-75 season he was the 3A, CIF player of the year in California at Morningside High, and that after just two years of organized basketball . . . played there with Ag playmaker Oscar Williams . . . son of Winifred Santos.

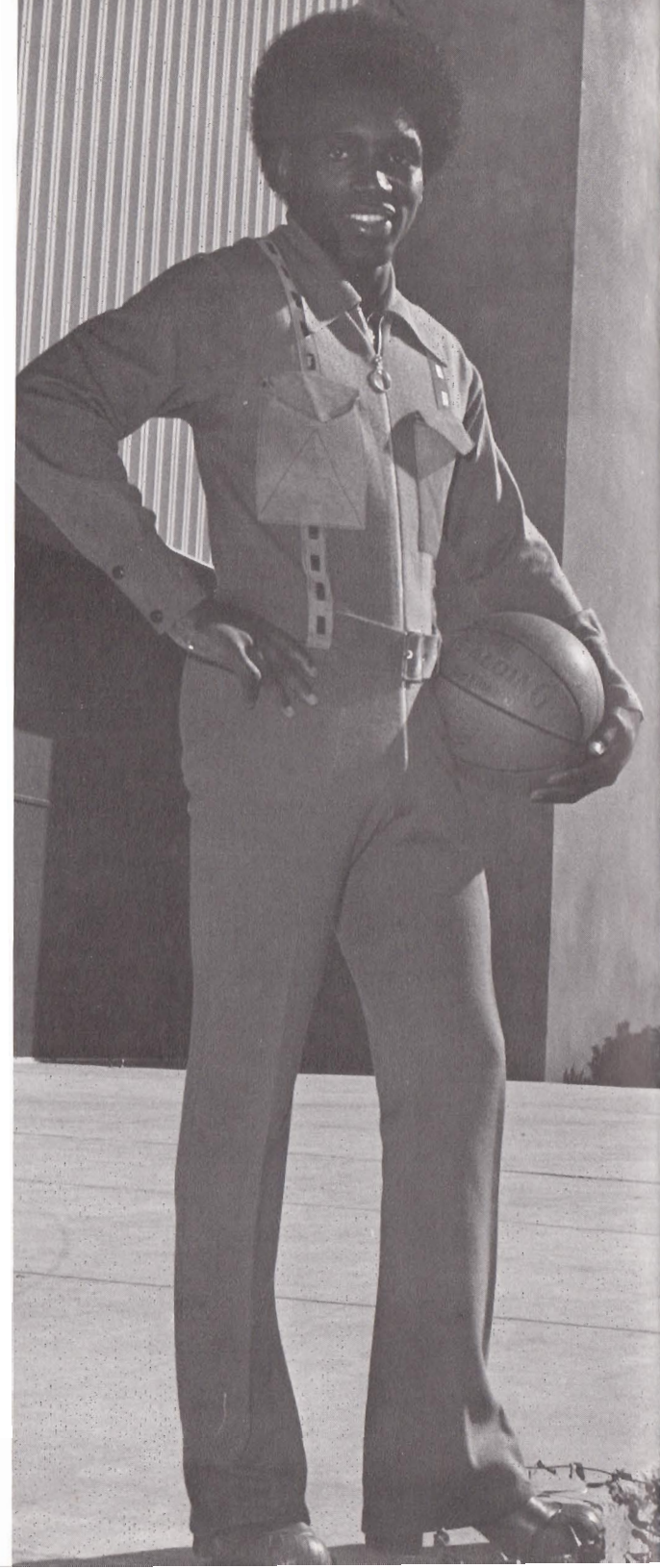

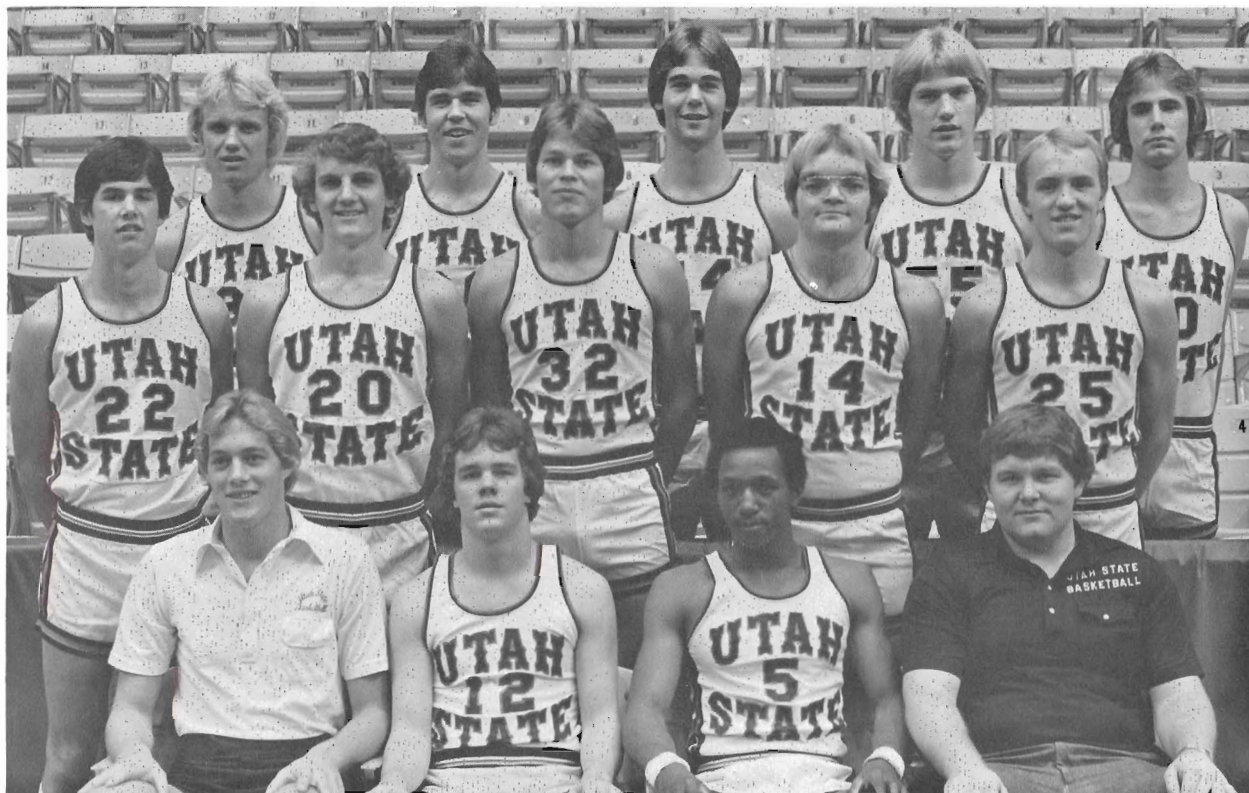
**Guard . . . 5-11 . . . 173 . . . Sr . . . 2VL . . . Los Angeles, Calif . . . 21 . . . born: 4/4/56 in Los Angeles . . . Social Work major who hopes to pursue a career with the FBI . . .** through the ups and downs, the highs and lows of the past three seasons, Williams' on-the-floor value to the Ags has been undeniable . . . "Os" is the Ags' alltime career assist leader (394) after 65 games . . . Jeff Tebbs' previous career assists record was 294, set in 77 games . . . for Oscar that's 6.1 assists a game and that translates to 12 points . . . added to his own career scoring average of six points a game, that means Williams has been good for 18 points a game the past three years . . . he's been a starter in 53 of those 65, more than any current Aggie player . . . his 185 assists last year (almost eight a game) is also the one-season assists record . . . had his career scoring high with 24 in USU's late-season win last year at Denver but he was equally brilliant in an early season 92-90 victory over Utah when he scored 15 and passed for a current school record 16 assists . . . a quarterback who makes the Ags go, Oscar is a quality point guard who is a ball handler supreme . . . there can't be many collegiate guards his equal as a middle man on the fastbreak . . . his ability to shoot the ball should not be construed as great, but he improved his marksmanship to 42.5% during 24 games last year and then it really shot up during the team's tour of Australia (52.7%) . . . and Oscar was

fourth in "shots attempted" during the trip, so he's apparently not shooting any less, just more selectively . . . he also averaged 13.4 points a game and 6.5 assists a game . . . "I can assure you Oscar wants this team to succeed as much as any of us do," said Dutch Belnap. "His play, without doubt, is one of our keys this year. His ball handling and ability to penetrate in deep with the ball are unquestionable. And I think he has improved over the summer in his overall approach to the game and to coaching." . . . Williams' athletic ability transcends the basketball arena . . . he is USU's most explosive jumper, he is credited with an unusual vertical jump of 37" . . . it is a very real possibility his name will come up during the 1978 NFL draft . . . the Dallas Cowboys have already talked to Oscar and timed his speed, evaluating him as a possible defensive secondary performer . . . one writer characterized Oscar thusly: "a guy you'd almost expect to see on a riverboat, wearing a plaid vest with a gold watch in his pocket. He's a hustler . . ." . . . showed up at USU prior to the 1974-75 season with high school teammate Mike Santos from LA's Morningside High . . . that club was 28-1 and 29-3 with Oscar as the quarterbacking guard . . . he was a key figure to USU's 21-6 season and drive to an NCAA berth during 1974-75 . . . he became a starter early in that freshman year . . . son of Oscar Williams, Sr.

# Head Coach Dutch Belnap: A Winner

This 1977-78 season marks at exactly 10 years the Dutch Belnap-Utah State coaching relationship. This is the Dutchman's fifth year as the school's Head Basketball Coach.

The school's 11th head coach, Belnap's cumulative four-year record is 66-40 (62.2%). The 15-12 record of a year ago was his fourth winning record as the Aggie head coach.

Since Dutch joined Ladell Andersen's staff prior to the 1968-69 season, and including his own four-year head coaching record, the Ags have won 148 games, or 17 a year.

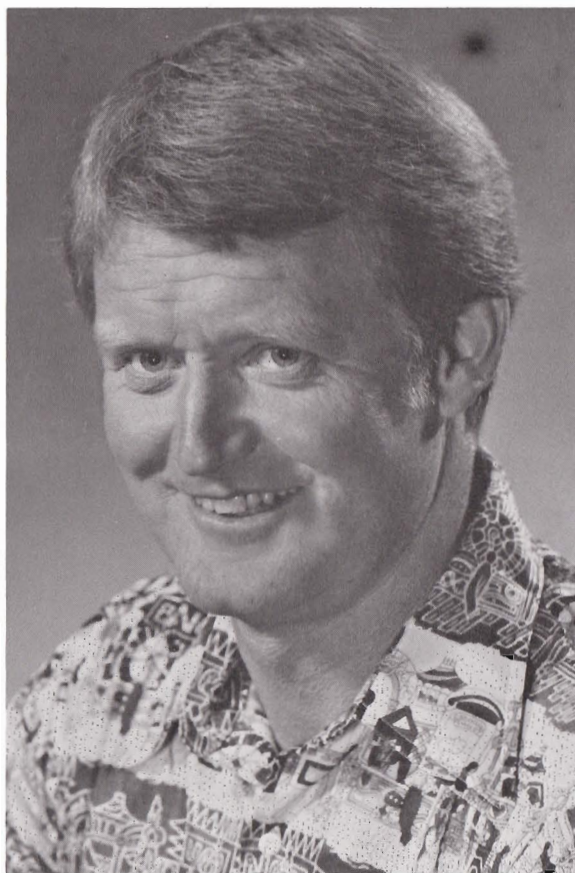
During that time the Ags have won spots into the 1970, 1971 and 1975 NCAA Playoffs. The 1974-75 team, Belnap's second unit, was 21-5 during the regular season. That's the second best record in the school's history. For his job that year, Dutch was named the NABC "Coach of the Year" in district seven.

That 1974-75 team finished 13th in the final Board of Coaches poll; a mid-season 13-game winning streak is the longest in the school's history.

That group hit 50.1% of its shots—another school record—and, as always, based their success on intelligence and patience . . . in the Belnap style.

Recognized as an outstanding recruiter, going back to his first years with the Aggies during the late 1960's, the 45-year-old Belnap and his staff have an enviable record in consistently recruiting the best of Utah's high school talent.

Dutch was an assistant at USU for five years before he was designated head coach in 1973. He promptly went to work, fashioned a 16-10 rookie season, and it was evident the Ags were on the rebound.



He joined Ladell Andersen's staff and during his five assistantship years was important in the USU program which won 80 games and played in those two NCAA tournaments. That includes the NCAA Western Regional Championship game in 1970 against UCLA.

He spent three years directing the frosh program through one of its most flourishing periods. While compiling an impressive 47-13 record, he coached the likes of Jeff Tebbs, Bob Lauriski, Jim Boatwright and Nate Williams,

among others. Later he spent two years as the chief assistant and became head coach in March, 1973.

Dutch relates to the athletes on his teams; they are treated as individuals and grown men.

A firm disciplinarian, he generally soft sells rather than screams his players into respect. And, he is not one to allow his talent to get out of hand over playing time and who scores points. It may be a coach's biggest challenge . . . he handles it well.

An Aggie grad, class of 1958, Dutch received his master's degree from Utah State University in 1965. He had earlier played football and basketball at Weber Junior College.

He was General Manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers' Ogden farm club the summers of 1967 and 1968. The second year he was named minor league baseball's "Executive of the Year."

A prep coach in three sports at Ogden's Weber High, he assumed the head basketball coaching duties in 1966. His 1961 Warrior baseball team won the state's high school title.

A Navy veteran and native of Ogden, Dutch and his wife Faye have three sons: Rob, Tim, and Mike.

After coaching JV clubs to 16-4 and 18-6 records his first two years, Tueller returns for his fifth season on Belnap's staff.

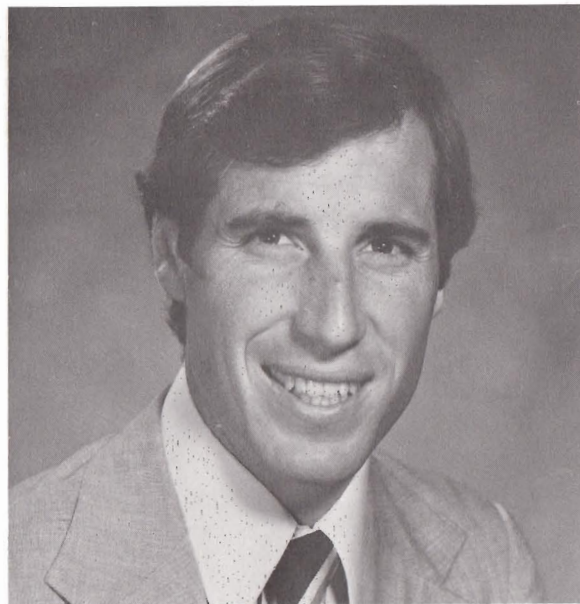
Tueller, 39, is a 1959 Aggie graduate. He handles academic counseling of the Aggie ballplayers as well as regional recruiting duties and he assists with varsity coaching.

The new Aggie aide is USU's recruiting coordinator in addition to his coaching duties, joining a staff of Belnap and Rod Tueller.

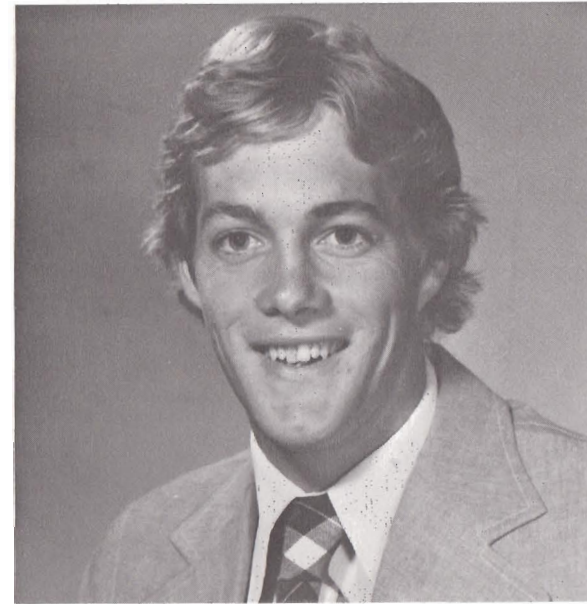

A fixture on the Aggie basketball scene for four years as a player, Jeff Meyer is handling an assignment this year as the Junior Varsity coach.

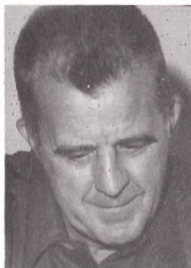
He should be well suited for the new job of tutoring the young Aggie players, considering his development through the JV program at USU.

Jeff is a Ventura, California native and is married to the former Janet Hatch of Ogden. They have one son, Joshua Lee.

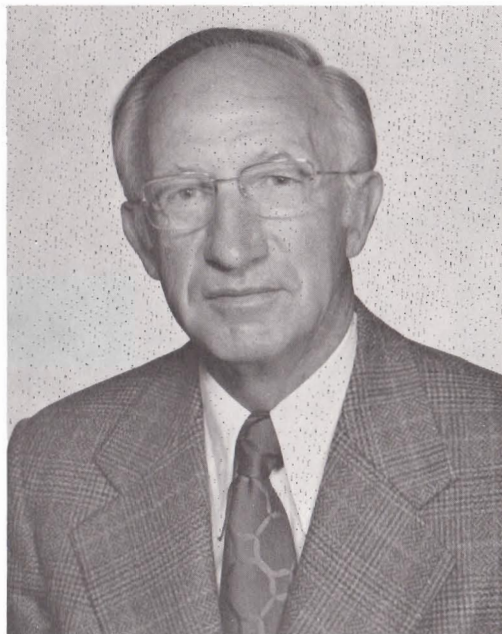




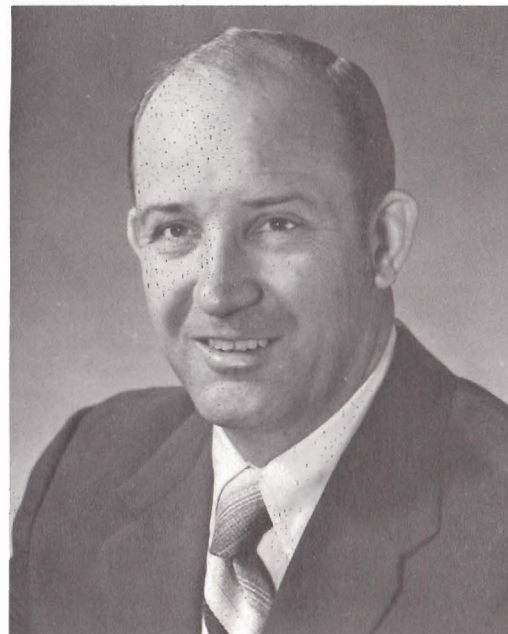

## Ladell Andersen, Athletic Director

USU's aggressive and progressive Athletic Director, Ladell Andersen, carries his positive attitude and excitement for Aggie athletics into his fifth year at the helm of the Big Blue program.

Ladell took over the reins of the Aggie program in December of 1972 after two years with the ABA's Utah Stars as head coach. Prior to his stint with the Stars he had a 10-year career as the head basketball coach with the Aggies.

**Andersen sees a great future for Utah State athletics. He foresees a program that will continue to grow as the school and community grow; growth not necessarily in the size of the program, but in its' quality.**

"My objective as athletic director is not to have a broad program but rather a competitive program with the sports we have," he said.

USU's recent decision makes the Aggies a full fledged member of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association next year.

**Ladell feels the major objective of the Athletic program is to represent the university in an official capacity and then to entertain the students, alumni and interested followers.**

The goal for the Aggies under Andersen is to maintain the NCAA Division I status it now holds and remain a major university. Those goals, he said, may call for future expansion of facilities and an increase in fan support to fill those facilities.

Andersen's coaching term with the Aggies (1961-1971) saw him become the winningest basketball coach in the school's history.

**While with the Stars his two team's combined for a 115-53 record, the winningest two-year record in the history of the ABA.**

A Malad, Idaho, native, "Andy" first became an Aggie in 1947 when he came to USU on a make-good scholarship basis. Four years later he had twice been named all-Skyline guard.

Following his 1952 graduation and a playing career with the AAU Denver Bankers, he worked as an assistant to Jack Gardner at Utah for five years before starting his career at USU in 1961.

# The Spectrum

An average of almost 8,000 fans a game have watched the Aggies in action in seven years since the dedication of the Spectrum, December 1, 1970 (USU defeated Ohio State, 95-89).

Some 754,779 fans have filed through the turnstiles in USU's 84 home games during that time.

The Spectrum — one of the nation's most complete college arenas — comfortably seats 10,270 (5,000 student capacity and 3,800 season ticket availabilities). All are chair back seats done in a pleasant color scheme of light orange, dark orange, light gold and yellow. There are 36 rows of seats completely encircling the floor.

Virtually every need common to the staging of a major college game or tournament is provided for including complete dressing room and meeting room facilities for four teams. Aggie teams use the north locker rooms and the visitors the south facilities. The teams enter the playing floor via nearby ramps.

The playing floor is permanent and is constructed of maple on a cushion, over concrete. The sound system is the most modern available

and uses the cluster sound program. Scoreboards are installed at each end of the Spectrum.

# Utah State University



The importance of the individual is emphasized at Utah State University. Additional impetus is being given to individualizing the baccalaureate degree. This is a system by which the individual can pattern his/her program within University policy and progress at his/her speed.

Utah State University has a three-fold purpose: teaching, research, and extension. USU also cooperates with various agencies on a national and international level to help promote understanding and share knowledge.

With a student body of 9,436, Utah State has advantages of both the large and small schools, with such features as a spacious library, excellent laboratories, and top-rated cultural attractions, including world-famous symphonies, ballets, pianists, singers, and lecturers. These advantages are combined with individualized programs characterized by close personal attention.

This University was founded in 1888 as a part of the public educational system of Utah and operates under the constitution and laws of the state. It belongs to a great family of institutions known as land-grant universities, which had their origin in 1862. A rich curriculum is offered in the arts and sciences, in both undergraduate and graduate programs. Degrees granted include the Bachelor's and Master's

degrees, Doctor of Education (EdD), and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD).

USU includes eight resident colleges with 47 departments, a School of Graduate Studies, University Extension, and several research programs. There are also current programs in education aid to several foreign countries.

USU is accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, and is on the accepted list of the Association of American Universities, and of the American Council on Education and is listed by other accrediting agencies.

A fifteen-member State Board of Regents governs the Utah state system of higher education. This board has the responsibility for state-wide master planning for higher education, assignment of roles to the several institutions in the state system, and control of operating and capital budgets for the institutions. USU has a nine-member Institutional Council. This council has the responsibility of implementing the assigned roles, including the appointment of personnel and the enactment of rules and governing regulations.

Logan, Utah, home of Utah State University, is a town of 25,000 population located in northern Utah, 80 miles north of Salt Lake City.
