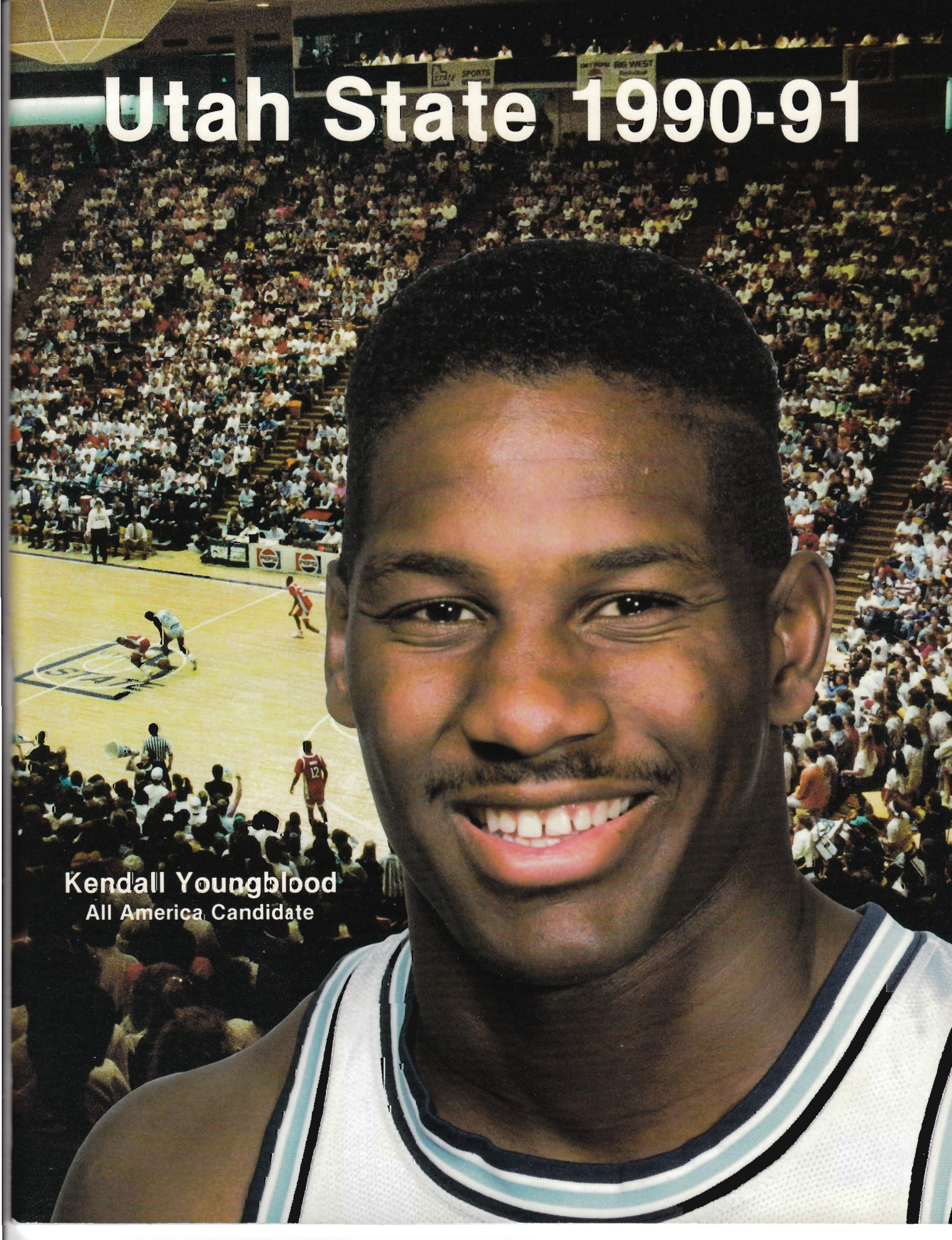

# Utah State University



Utah State University, founded in 1888, is a prestigious institution, sure of its identity and proud of its reputation for innovative teaching. USU reflects the outlooks and attitudes of the people who attend. Contemporary views among students, faculty, and staff mix with traditional opinions.

A beautiful, well-kept campus in Logan, Utah, USU includes more than 100 buildings located on 400 acres. An additional 7,000 acres used for agricultural and other research programs is located throughout the state.

**The importance of the individual is the focus at USU. Additional impetus is always being given to individualizing the baccalaureate degree. This is a system by which the individual can pattern his program within university policy and progress at his speed.**

USU has a three-fold purpose: teaching, research and extension. USU also cooperates with various agencies on a national and international level to help promote understanding and share knowledge.

With a studentbody of 15,572 - 85% of them undergraduates - USU has ad-

vantages of both the large and small schools, with such features as a spacious library, excellent laboratories and top-rated cultural attractions. These advantages are combined with individualized programs characterized by close personal attention.

**The studentbody represents every county in Utah, all 50 states and 90 foreign countries. The majority of these students (80%) live on or near campus.**

Housing accommodations, both on and off campus, are available in many different forms. The student may choose to live on-campus in an apartment-style residence hall. Off-campus living accommodations range from studio apartments to four-bedroom apartments to private houses.

The University was founded as a part of the public education system of Utah and operates under the constitution and laws of the state. It belongs to a great family of institutions known as land-grant universities, which had their origin in 1862. A rich curriculum is offered in the arts and sciences, in both undergraduate and graduate programs. Degrees granted include the Bachelor's

and Master's degrees, Doctor of Education (EdD) and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD).

USU includes eight resident colleges with 45 departments, a School of Graduate Studies, University Extension and research programs. There are also current programs in education aid to several foreign countries.

**The USU campus is situated on a bench that was once the shore of prehistoric Lake Bonneville. It is located at the north end of the state in Logan, which is the county seat of Cache County (which has a population of about 70,000). Logan (34,000 population) offers a wide array of shops, services and other amenities that complement the University.**

Northern Utah's dry and sunny summers and falls allow students to enjoy the many outstanding recreation opportunities that are available. The list includes mountain biking, sailboarding, rock climbing, waterskiing, hiking and camping. Winters on the valley floor are relatively mild although the surrounding mountains receive plenty of snow for cross-country and downhill skiing - just a 30 minute drive up Logan Canyon.

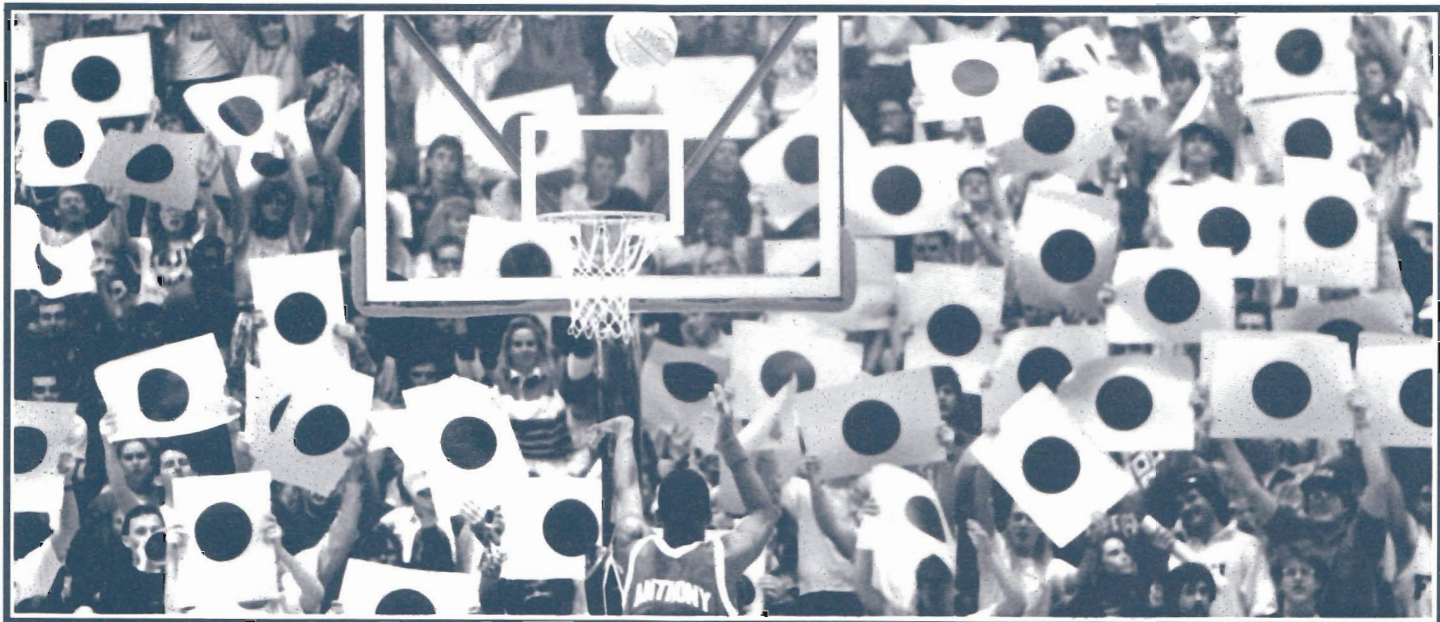

# Outlook

There seems little question Utah State basketball will be improved in 1990-91, Kohn Smith's third year as head coach. The Ags are coming off 12-16 and 14-16 records the past two years.

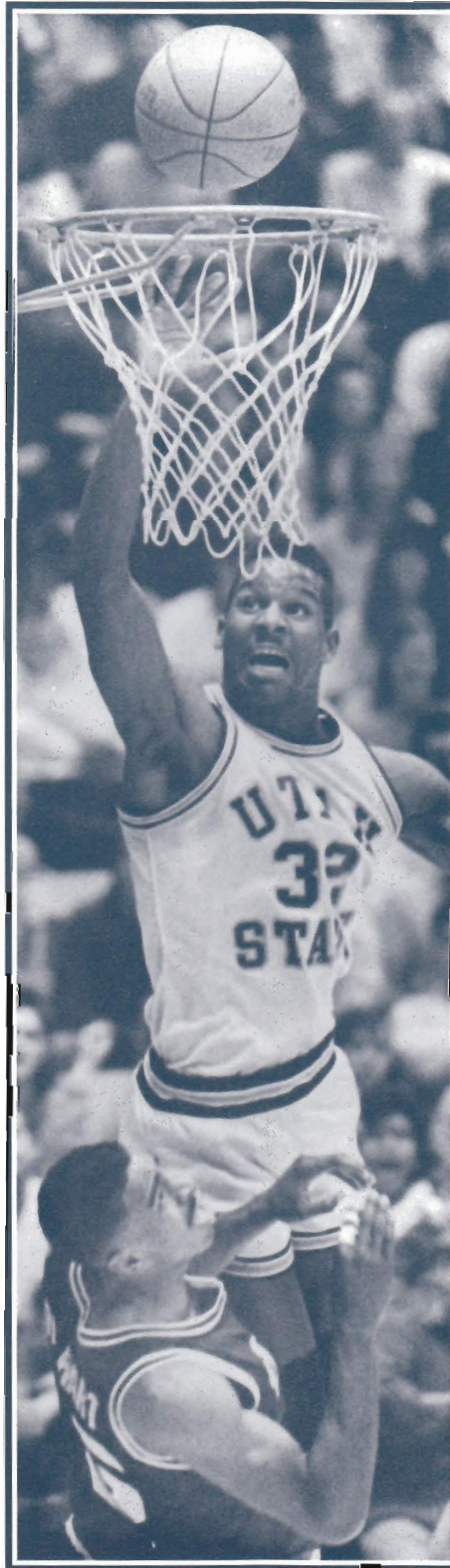
However, that "improvement" tag might apply to much of the Big West Conference as well. The Ags' progress the past two years has certainly been paralleled by that of the league in general, topped by UNLV's resounding victory in the national championship game.

**Already one of the league's better shooting teams, the Aggies feel they will be better because of: 1) improvement in that offensive category, 2) quality depth which may take them nine or 10 men deep, 3) the number of experienced athletes returning and 4) the intangibles, such as a strong "chemistry" which became apparent during early-season drills.**

The Aggies — after last year's fifth place league finish — return four of five starters. (6-6 Darrel White is gone.) So experience is available. And the depth is improving...for at least two reasons: point guard candidate **Jay Goodman** — the Iowa State transfer — becomes eligible and a group of newcomers led by freshman **Eric Franson** is talented enough to make a difference.

Of course, the Aggie talent parade is led by 6-4 junior **Kendall Youngblood**, a fulltime starter his first two years in college basketball, and a second team all-Big West choice last year. He was the team's top scorer (15.4 ppg), he was the only Aggie in the starting lineup all 30 games last winter, and he enjoyed the seventh most productive season by a sophomore in USU history. Youngblood two years ago was the Big West "Freshman of the Year."

And, he is versatile. Over two

seasons Kendall has played the point guard spot (most of his freshman year) plus he is accomplished at both the "2"

and "3" positions. He was last year's "Cec" Baker Award recipient as the team's MVP.

**"Both Kendall and I know that we can't be content with what he has accomplished his first two years," said Smith. "I expect a lot of him; I'm sure I'll demand more of him than I might of some others."**

The other USU principles in 1990-91:

**Rich Jardine** (6-8, Sr., #2 scorer at 11.8 ppg; starter in 20 of 30 games; named "Most Improved Player" last year; an accomplished long-range shooter; was the scoring leader for part of the early season).

**Randy Funk** (6-7, Sr., #3 scorer at 11.4 ppg; #1 rebounder at 6.5 rpg; #1 FG% at 56%; rugged inside player whose rebounding late in the year was particularly effective; was named the Ags' "Mr. Hustle").

**Allen Gordon** (6-0, Sr., avg. 7.2 ppg and was team leader in assists [121] and steals [51]; starter at point guard in 19 of 28 games; became a more confident and effective floor leader as the year wore on and his assists-to-turnovers ratio late in the year was exceptional).

**Jeff Parris** (6-8, Sr., avg. 6.6 pts. and 5.1 RBs a game; rugged inside player known for his strong defense and rebounding; "Top Defensive Player" award winner last year for the Aggies; starter in 17 of 29 games; fouled out 6 times).

Parris was injured during an early-September pickup game and subsequent knee surgery is expected to keep him out of game action until sometime in December.

The Aggies should get help from backup guard **Matt Barnes** plus last year's two freshman reserves: 6-6 **Gary Patterson** and 6-4 **Brent Lofton**. Barnes appeared in all but two games last year.



# Outlook

Last year's walk-on **Roger Daley**, at 6-7, is another physically talented inside player who appeared only briefly (13 games) but had some effective moments. He was the Big West Conference champion in the discus during the spring at the league Track and Field Championships at UNLV.

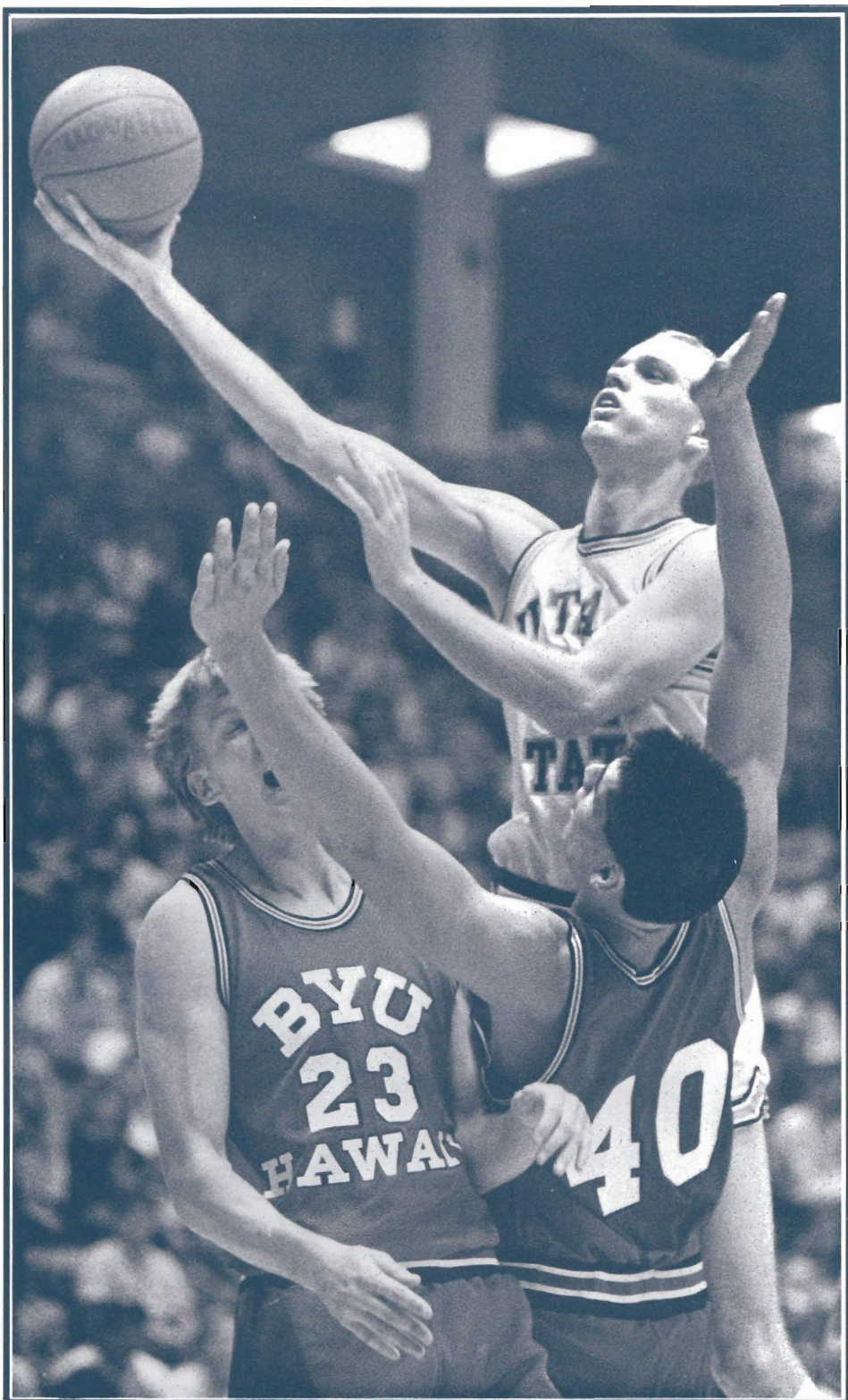
Among the newcomers, the 6-7 freshman **Franson** appears to be talented enough to fit in quickly. With 27 points he was the best player on the floor when he led the Utah high school all-stars to a win over the touring Russian Junior National team during the spring in Salt Lake City. He averaged 27.1 points a game last year at Utah's American Fork High School. Others to watch: **Bryon Ruffner** (6-6, Timpview High, Orem, UT) and **Charlie Sager** (6-10, South Grand Prairie High in Texas).

It has become an Aggie tradition to hurry the ball upcourt quickly and the 1990-91 team should be a very good uptempo team. And, again, coaches expect this will be a better shooting team than a year ago.

Smith said he will continue to emphasize better ballhandling; Goodman's addition will help there. And a heavy off-season push to improve overall team strength is apparently paying off. Upgrading the rebounding is another one of Coach Smith's targets.

So much depends on 1) the team staying injury-free, 2) coaches receiving big years from key players and a good season of play from others and 3) developing an adequate inside game and solid help from the bench.

**"I have a lot to be optimistic about," said Smith. "I was happy with a lot of what happened last year and the improvement this team made. It is a real advantage to return all the athletes who spent a season with us last year.**



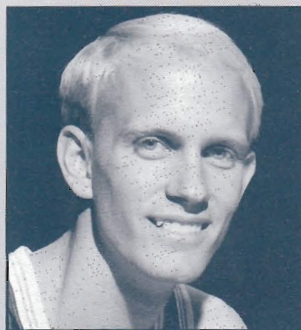

## USU Sports Radio Network

**Bob Appuhn** and former USU basketball squadmember **Steve Skinner** are teamed for a third year of broadcasts on the Utah State Sports Radio Network. Appuhn handles the play-by-play description while Skinner serves as analyst. The last two seasons Aggie game broadcasts have been heard by more people than at any other time in the school's history. The broadcasts are delivered via satellite to radio stations in four states as well as thousands of private satellite dishes across the country.

Among the stations expected to participate on the network are KVNU and KVFM (Logan), KBXQ (Tremonton), KTKK (Salt Lake City), KSVC (Richfield), KUTA (Blanding), KNEU (Roosevelt-Vernal), KSGI (St. George) and KVISI (Montpelier, ID).

Network activities also include daily sports updates on the Aggie hotline and a weekly (Tuesday evening) sports call-in program at **1-800-47-STATE**. Network President is Stephen W. Skinner.

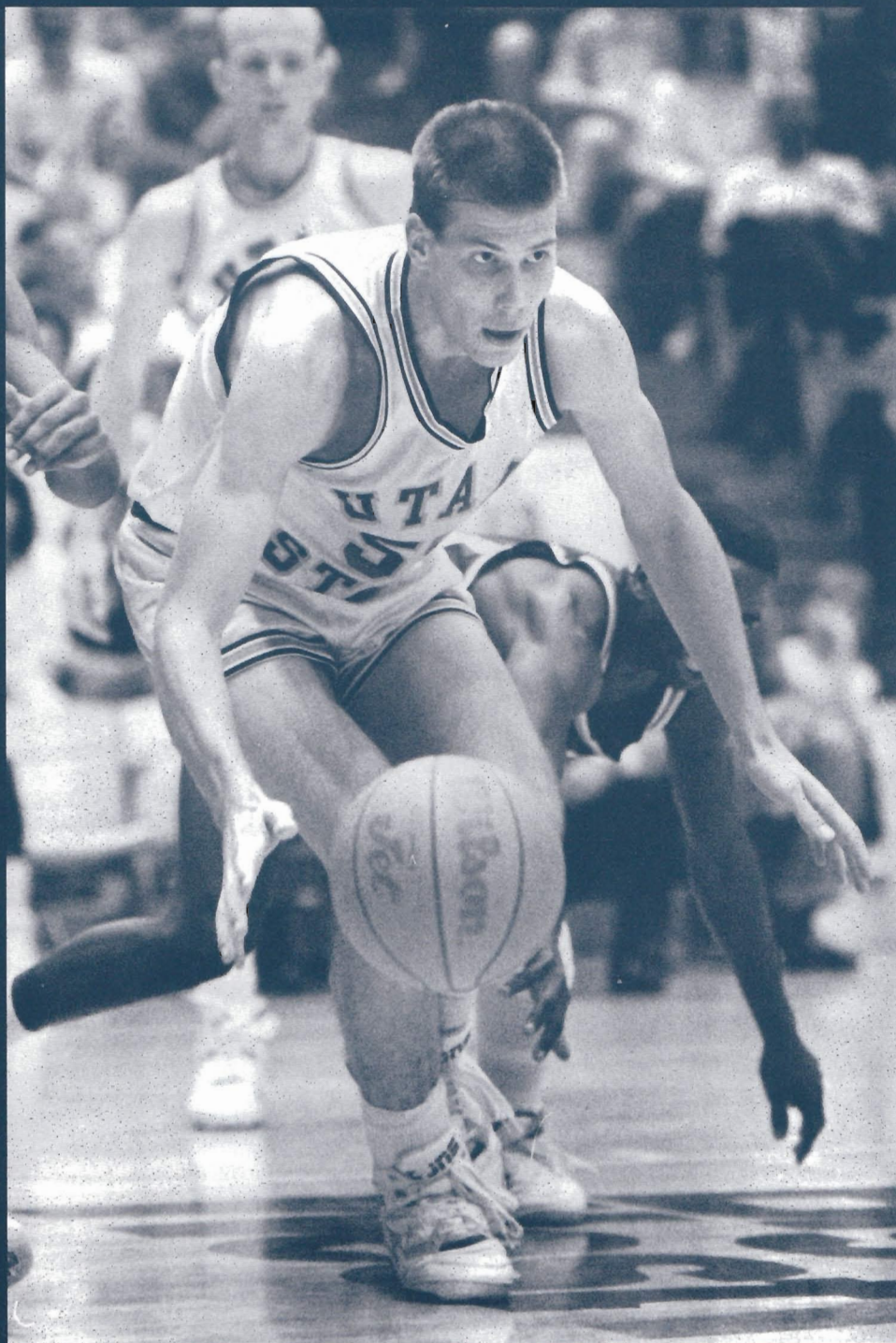

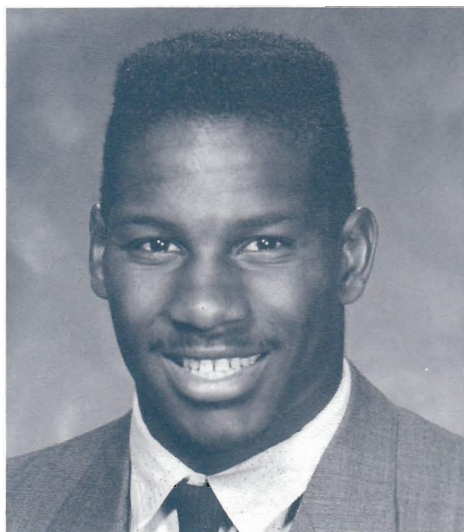

It has been nearly 30 years since Cornell Green left Utah State for the NFL (Dallas Cowboys) after distinguishing

himself as one of the school's greatest basketball players ever...Green, at 6-4, eventually became a regular all-pro selection as a safety-cornerback... Kendall Youngblood is one of the few Aggies during the ensuing decades who has been blessed with the athletic skills to make such a sport-to-sport transition...recruited out of Ogden's Bonneville High School as much for his football-playing ability as for his advanced skills on the basketball court, he chose USU

(and basketball)...and he didn't miss a beat, joining the Ags and becoming an immediate starter his freshman year...and, as a sophomore last year, he was the only Aggie basketball player to take the court as a starter in all 30 games...obviously has reached a skill level which qualifies him as one of the best athletes in what is widely regarded as one of the most "athletic" basketball conferences: the Big West...and he still has two seasons to play... Kendall has shown, since his arrival in Logan, a dogged determination to improve what he perceives as the weaker parts of his game...he worked extremely hard

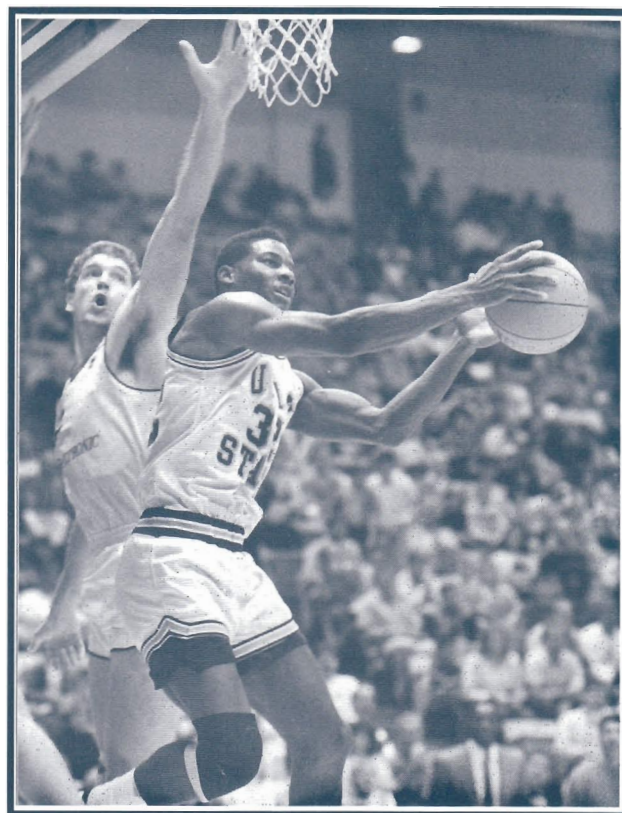
during the summer on his three-point shooting and shots off of the dribble... certainly the best athlete on a deeper, improved, more versatile Aggie team ...the Big West Conference "Freshman of the Year" following the 1988-89 season, he was chosen second team all-league last year following a distinguished sophomore season...his 15.4 ppg scoring average led the Aggies and it was the seventh best year by an Aggie sophomore in school history...shot the ball well (49% from the floor, 78% from the line) and was one of the team's top rebounders (4.9 a game)...has now started in 57 of 58 possible games... was the leading scorer in 13 of last year's 30 games...was in double figures 26 of 30 games last year...he finished with 12

A year ago — right out of high school — it took Gary two weeks into pre-season drills to establish himself as the Ags'

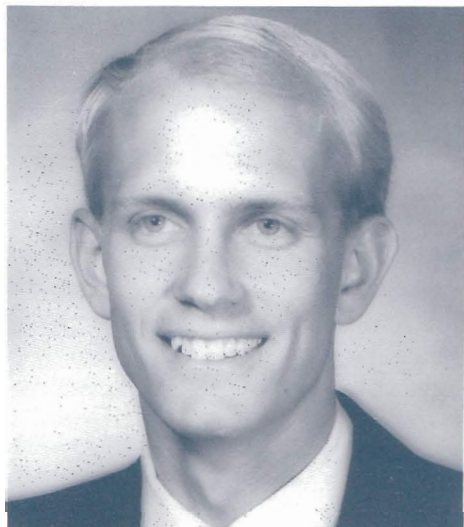

# Head Coach

There was no greater boyhood basketball fan of the Aggies than the man who now directs the school's fortunes in the sport.

Kohn Smith, 38, grew up in Cache Valley and realized one of his dreams when he was named the school's 13th head coach late in the 1987-88 season, while serving as an assistant at USU to Rod Tueller.

**He had returned to the USU program from the University of Indiana where he had been an assistant coach to Bob Knight.**

This is his third year as USU's head coach. He has directed the Aggies to seasons of 12-16 and 14-16.

"Kohn has everything it takes to be a great basketball coach, because he has everything it takes to be a great person."

Those were Coach Knight's words during a speaking engagement in late-September, 1989, in Utah State's Dee Glen Smith Spectrum.

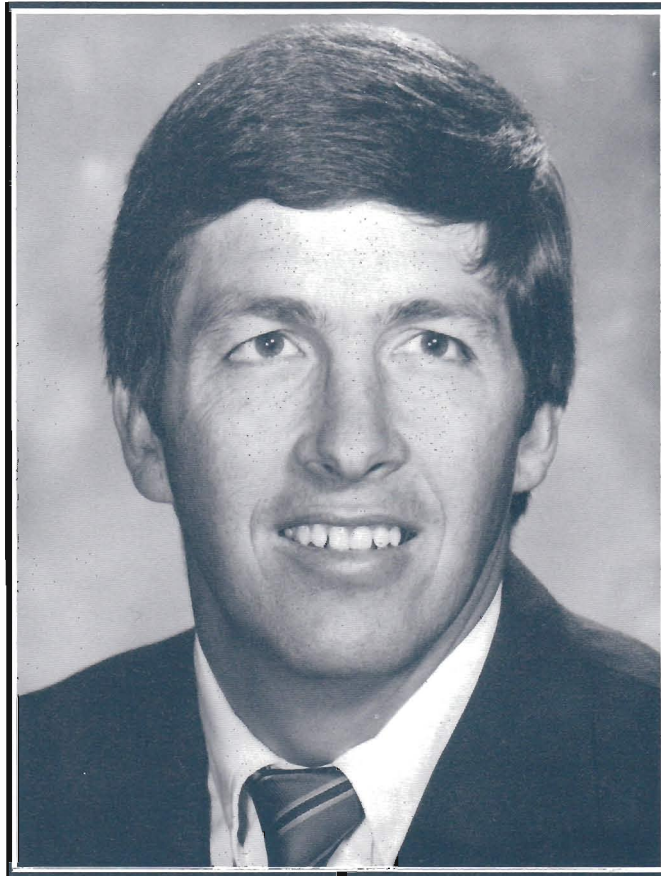
**A meaningful testimonial, particularly from the man who was Smith's boss when Kohn was a six-year assistant at IU (1981-87).**

The young Aggie head coach will likely tell you his first two years as a collegiate head man were among the most profitable learning experiences of his professional life.

Under Kohn the Aggies have posted Big West Conference records of 10-8 and 8-10.

His first two seasons are somewhat of a departure from what had been an impressive record in college basketball as an assistant coach to Knight and Tueller: seven seasons in the major college game...seven trips to post-season basketball tournaments.

**It was Kohn's work with the defense, as an assistant coach in 1987-88, which was instrumental in the Ags winning their first-ever**

**conference tournament championship and the school's first-ever automatic NCAA post-season bid.**

From 1983 until he left IU in October of 1987, he was in charge of the Hoosiers' basketball recruiting and he was continually listed in national scouting service bulletins as one of the nation's top recruiters.

He also had extensive on-floor coaching responsibilities, assisting with formulation of game plans, organizing and scheduling of scouting and assisting in the direction of IU's three-week summer basketball camp which involved 1,800 campers and 110 coaches.

In 1985, during IU's around-the-world basketball tour, he actually served as head coach while Coach Knight observed from the stands. The Hoosiers played teams from Canada, Japan, China, Yugoslavia, the USSR, the Netherlands and Finland.

**Upon his return to USU to become head coach, there were plenty of questions about his career with Knight at Indiana.**

"They want to know what it was like to work for him," says Smith, "Then they asked if I would be like him in my coaching."

Smith does share Knight's passion for the outdoors — hunting and fishing — and they both espouse defense as one of the cornerstones of their shared philosophies of the game.

"I'm not Bobby Knight," he said. "In a lot of ways I'd like to be. But my personality is different. I'm like Coach Knight in that I would like to do a lot of things for college athletics. First, I'm concerned about doing everything I can do to help our players academically, to insure that they have a future after they finish playing

college basketball. I'm concerned about rules; about the real integrity of college athletics. In that regard I hope I'm a great deal like him".

"I've been able to learn a great deal technically about the game from coach Knight. We would like to pattern our teams after his great teams. Above all, they really play hard."

And what about his sideline demeanor, relative to Coach Knight?

**"I want to be enthusiastic on the sideline," he said. "I want our players to play enthusiastically. We all, at times, get upset. I'm sure there will be times like that. We just can't help but do that when something means so much to us as a game does. I like to think that I'm a coach that can keep pretty good control. If I do get upset, it will be because I am trying to help my team."**

And, again, a Kohn Smith basketball philosophy begins with defense.

"We want to try to put as much

pressure as we can on the basketball, as far out as we can. We want to play defense as a team. We're basically a man-to-man defensive team; we try to put as much pressure as we can on the opponent.

"Offensively, we're first of all concerned with trying to get the very best shot, whether it's on a fastbreak, secondary break or a set offense."

After getting his start in organized basketball playing for Tueller at Logan High, Kohn went on to earn all-ICAC honors at the College of Eastern Utah (1970-72) and was later named an NAIA Academic All-American and NAIA honorable mention All-American at Southern Utah State College. (1972-74).

**In 1974 he was named SUSC's Athlete of the Year, Scholar Athlete Award winner and Outstanding Basketball Player.**

He began his coaching career at Idaho's West Side High (1974-79) and

Utah's Bear River (1979-81) and had been named to head the Sky View High Program (April, 1981) when he left to join Knight at Indiana.

In both 1977 and 1978 he was named Idaho's A-3 Coach of the Year and he coached West Side to state championships both years.

His overall high school coaching record: 119-42. (He also compiled a 33-16 record as West Side football coach, earning A-3 Coach of the Year honors in that sport in 1976.)

Kohn is a 1974 graduate of Southern Utah State.

He and his wife, Arlene, are the parents of four children: Tricia, Steven, Kelli, and Kristin.

## **Kohn in the pre-season:**

"We have been shooting the ball very well. We have had scrimmages in the 60% shooting range.

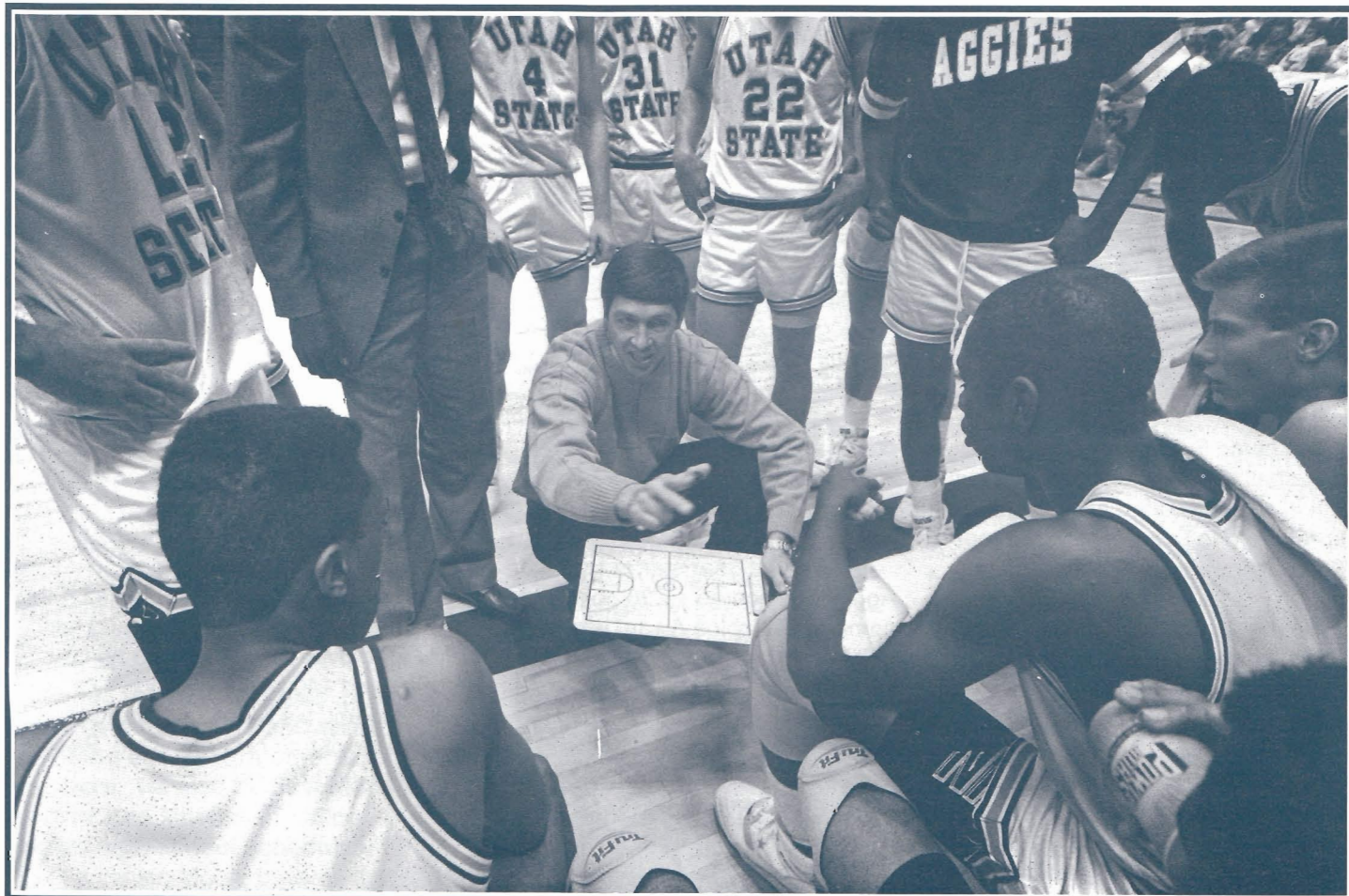
"This is our third year running the motion offense and it has really taken hold as an offense our players under-

stand and are able to execute. It's like they say about the game of backgammon: it takes five minutes to learn but a lifetime to know. With the intricacies of it, the motion offense takes a great deal of time to know and run, to execute it correctly.

"When we are in our transition offense we are able to be very effective at times. We like the way this team runs the floor.

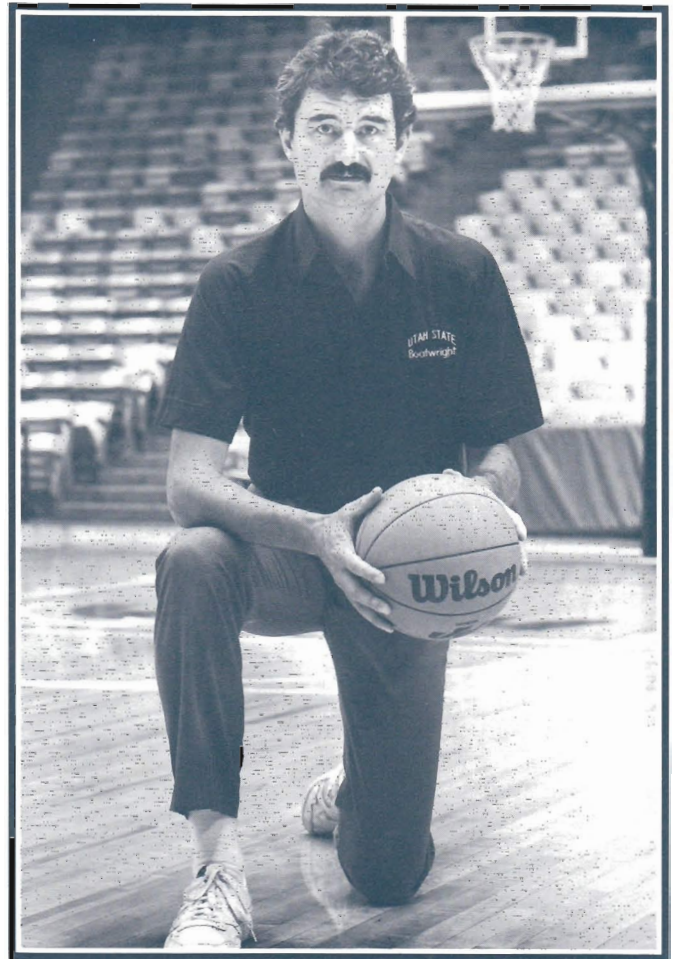
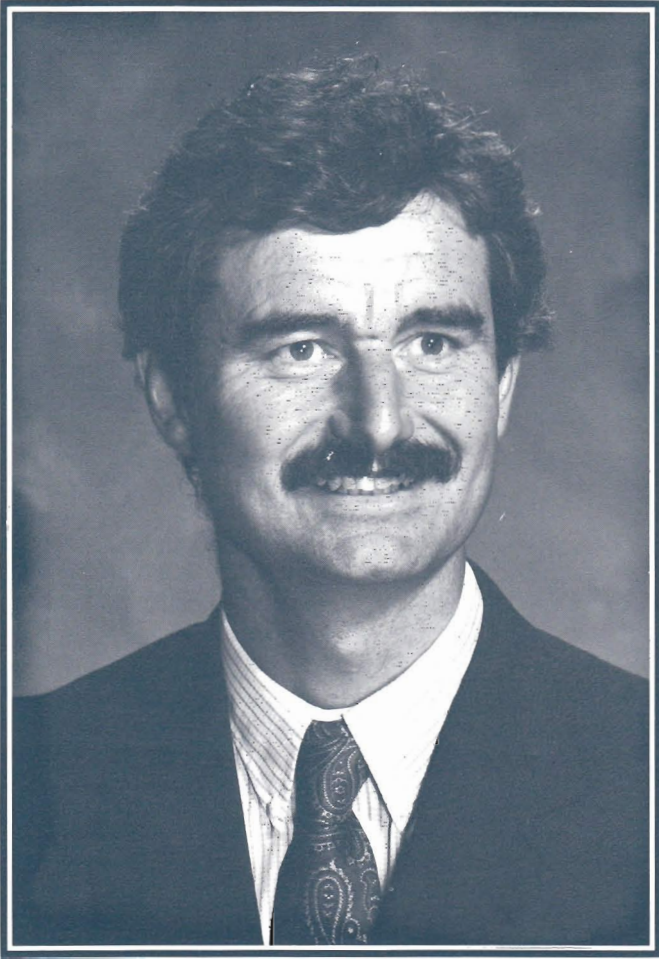
"Our defense is ahead of last year, too. That has been an emphasis during drills.

"Our best physical qualities lie in our quickness and ability to run the floor. These kids really like an uptempo, transition type of game. And, now, with some pressure tactics we will be using, we can do a better job of controlling the tempo of our games, possibly make our opponents shoot some quick shots or poor shots."





# Coaches



## Assistant Coach Jim Boatwright

This is Jim Boatwright's third year as a Utah State assistant coach. But these aren't the first three years he has been involved in Aggie basketball. In fact, the 1990-91 season marks the beginning of his third decade in USU hoops.

Jim came to USU in 1970 on a basketball scholarship and wound up 12th in career scoring at Utah State. He returned to Logan in the summer of 1988 to join Kohn Smith's coaching staff.

**Boatwright, 38, followed up a distinguished playing career in college and pro basketball with five years as the head coach at Star Valley High School in Afton, Wyoming. His teams compiled an 89-20 record and won the 1987-88 state high school championship, two region titles plus a state runnerup**

**finish.**

He was also a graduate assistant at USU to Rod Tueller in 1982-83, helping the Aggies to an NCAA berth as they faced Iowa in the tournament at Louisville, KY.

"It's a highlight of my playing and coaching career to return to Utah State and to work with Kohn and Jimmy," said Boatwright, a native of Rupert, Idaho.

As a three-year starter for the Aggies, he scored 1,236 points, was named the Robins Award winner as USU's "Athlete of the Year" in 1974 and went on to appear in the Pizza Hut post-season all-star game.

**Prior to attending Utah State, Boatwright had an outstanding high school career under Coach Les Roh at Minico High in Rupert, ID and later appeared in the prestigious**

**Dapper Dan High School All-Star game in Pittsburgh, PA.**

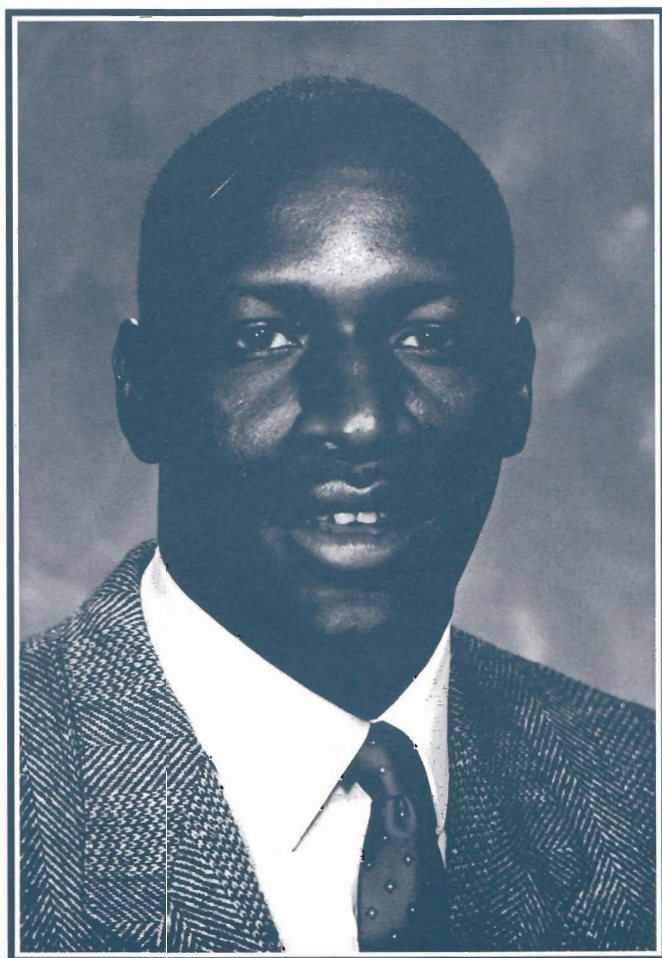
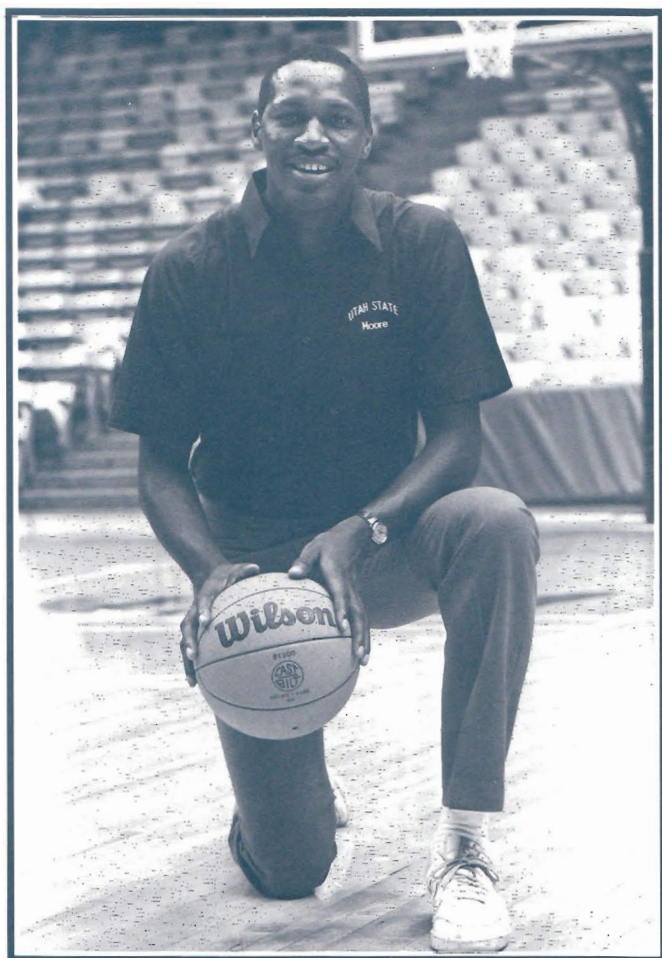
He was drafted by the Virginia Squires of the ABA but chose to play professionally in Europe. He spent eight years playing for the Macabbi Tel Aviv team in the European Pro Championship League, helping that team to a pair of European titles. Boatwright was chosen to the prestigious European Selective team and in 1980 was named to the Israeli Olympic team.

He has authored two books on the fundamentals of basketball and has logged over 650 hours as a private pilot and 140 hours piloting 747s.

He and his wife Chris are the parents of four children: Kate, Sarah, Daniel and Becky.



# Coaches



## Assistant Coach Jimmy Moore

Like Jim Boatwright, only a hiatus (of 12 years) in European professional basketball was able to keep Jimmy away from his love of USU and the Aggie basketball program. This is his fourth year back in Logan as an Aggie assistant coach.

Moore, 38, joined Rod Tueller's staff as a graduate assistant and was later elevated to full-time status where he remained when Kohn Smith was named head coach. (Tueller was an assistant coach under Dutch Belnap for the Aggies when Moore was a student-athlete.)

**Moore tutors the Aggies' power forwards and centers and splits the recruiting efforts with other staff members. He also helps Academic Advisor Ken Mitchell in aiding players with school schedules.**

As a player, Moore became the

Aggies' 14th best career scorer (1,164 points) in three varsity seasons. With Jimmy as a starter in 71 of his 79 career games, the Aggies went 53-26 and earned an NCAA post-season bid his senior year (1974-75).

The native of Leakesville, Mississippi averaged 19.3 points-a-game as a senior and scored a career high 40 points in a win over Wyoming. He was later selected to play in the East-West All-Star game in Oklahoma and the Pizza Hut Classic in Las Vegas and was twice (junior and senior year) selected to the all-district team.

His career averages for shooting (52.3%), free throws (76.3%) and rebounding (8.3) are among the best in Utah State history.

**He was drafted by both the Utah Stars (ABA) and the Seattle Super-sonics (NBA) but chose to play**

**professionally in Europe.**

During his 12-year playing career, Jimmy spent 10 years in Holland and two years in France, leading teams to national championships in both countries.

He was selected "Player of the Year" in Holland in 1977, playing for the 'Arke Reizen' team in the city of Enschede. He led the country in scoring that year and the following year, while leading France's professional teams in scoring, he helped the Mullhouse team to the national championship.

Before coming to Utah State in 1971, Jimmy had twice been selected Mississippi's high school player of the year (1969-70 and 1970-71)

Jimmy was married in early-November to the former Debbie Hales.



# Athletic Director

The nature of college athletics has seen monumental change as its popularity has exploded in the past decade. During that time, Athletic Director Rod Tueller has been a steady guide of the Utah State program.

**"Whether you like it or not, athletics and sports is a big part of society today, from the little leagues and their various activities to the big leagues and their professionals," Tueller said. "One of our themes of athletics at Utah State is the consistency of the Aggies. I can say that as a person who has lived here essentially all his life and have seen the continuity of the program."**

"I was here as a student, a patron, an employee, a coach and an administrator and I am proud of the fact that Utah State has withstood the storms nationally, locally and regionally and still has a viable product."

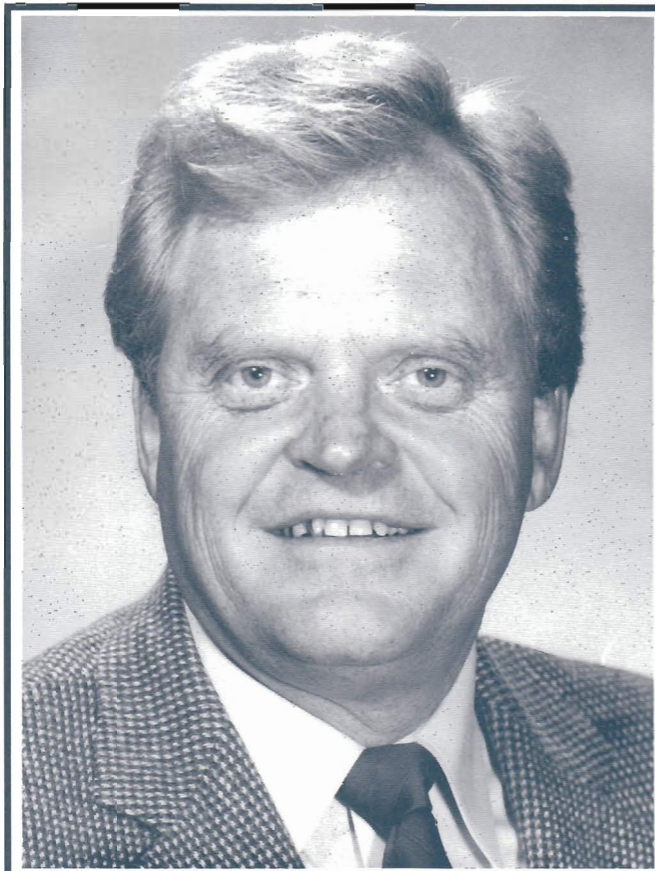
Now in his sixth year at the Aggie helm, Tueller continues his efforts as athletic director over the 14 sports participating at the Division I level.

Rod is one of the senior ranking members among the 10 athletic directors in the Big West Conference.

**He is currently the chair of the Big West Conference Television Committee which negotiates and renegotiates the league's television contracts for all sports, in addition to football and basketball.**

Tueller was recently (June, 1990) elected to a three-year term on the Executive Committee of the Division 1A Athletic Directors Association. That group is dealing with problems and issues pertinent to the major college football-playing schools in the country. They convene twice a year.

"I believe athletics has a very important and maybe even prestigious role to play within the community," Tueller said. "I would hope that the athletic department represents values,

directions, goals and objectives of the various communities. I really think Utah State athletics is coming very close to doing that."

**Tueller, who has spent the past three years devoting his full energies to directing the program, holds a long and illustrious career as student, coach and administrator during his years at Utah State. He spent nine years as the Aggies' head basketball coach, registering a 139-120 record and guiding his squads to a regular season title, a league tournament championship and four post-season appearances.**

What makes the record all the more impressive is that he served as both head coach and athletic director for four of those nine years.

"I'm proud of the fact that Utah State athletics has been a viable part of this community whether they are winning or losing, which indicates to me that the process is valuable, the

product is valuable," he said. "Athletics does have that universality of bonding everybody associated with the university - all the alumni, the boosters, faculty, staff and students."

**"I also believe that athletics is extracurricular and entertainment and that all of that has to be kept in mind. It should be kept within the bounds, goals, mission and objectives of the university and should never exceed those."**

Tueller became an assistant coach to Dutch Belnap at the beginning of the 1973-74 season and later became the school's 12th head coach prior to the 1979-80 season. During his 15 seasons in the Utah State coaching ranks he was involved in 423 USU games, a record for any basketball coaching figure ever at Utah State.

One of the brilliant young coaches to climb the ranks of Utah's prep game, he spent eight years (1965-73) as the head coach at Logan High, his alma mater. He continually had the Grizzlies in the state tournament, once finishing second. Prior to becoming Logan's head coach, he had spent two years there as an assistant and four years as the head man at Altamont.

**Tueller was an all-state high school player who spent a year-and-a-half in Jack Gardner's program at the University of Utah before transferring to Utah State to finish his collegiate work and graduating in 1959.**

"Utah State University has always been part of my life," he said. "My goal, for me personally, is to contribute to Utah State's tradition; that is all I want to do as long as I'm capable and productive."

Born in Cedar City, Tueller is active in his church and he and his wife, Valene, are parents of six children.

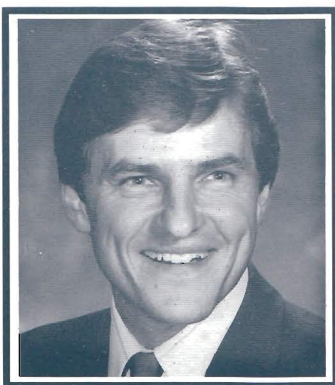
Leading the women's sports into the Big West in 1990-91 is Dr. Kaye Hart. Hart oversees the women's programs as Associate Athletic Director at USU.

**Ass't. AD/Communications**

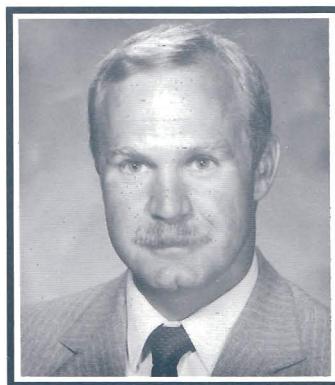

**Assistant AD/Business**

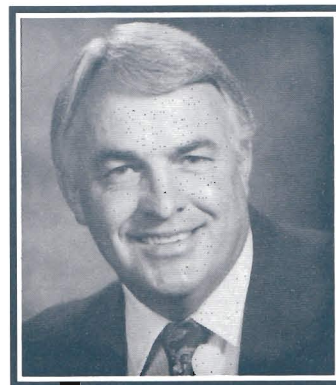

If a person has purchased a ticket for a Utah State function for the past 34 years chances are pretty good they have talked to Tom Moulton.

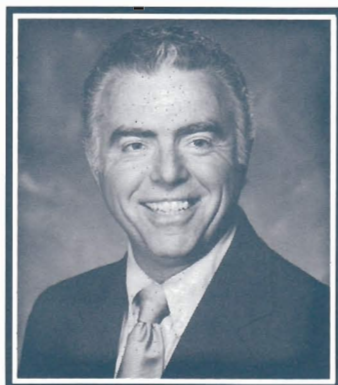
A 1950 graduate of USU, Moulton has been directing Utah State's total ticket selling operation — athletics and otherwise-- for those 34 years.

**Dale Mildenberger**

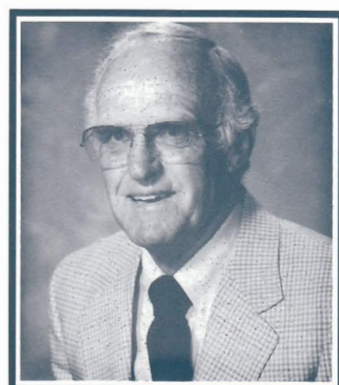
**Head Trainer**

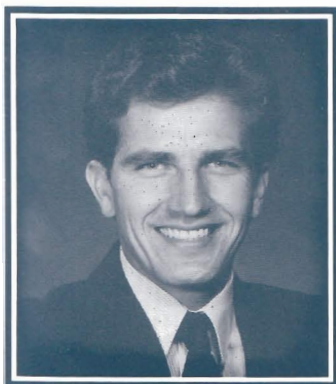
Seamons describes his job as one some fans would kill to have. After all he gets a sideline/sidecourt view of every Aggie game.

**Tim Monsell**

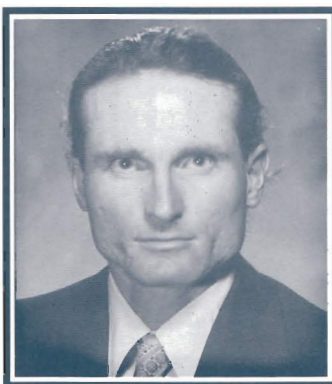
**Assoc. Sports Information Director - Women's**

**Strength Coach**

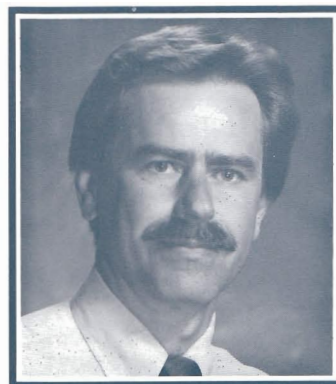

**Faculty Athletic Representative**

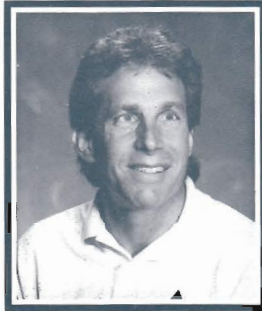

# Dee Glen Smith Spectrum



In its 21st year as home of the Aggies, the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum has gone over the 2,000,000 mark in attendance. 2,000,000 is the entire population of the Cache Valley (65,000) multiplied by 31.

An average of near 7,700 fans a game have watched the Aggies in action in 20 years since the dedication of the Spectrum, December 1, 1970 (USU defeated Ohio State, 95-89).



Dee Glen Smith

In 1988 the Spectrum's name was changed to the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum.

**Brigham City native Dee Glen Smith, who built one of America's largest grocery store chains, for many years joined his wife and three sons as substantial supporters of USU. Smith died in 1984.**

All three of his sons—Fred, Jeff and Richie—attended USU.

Exactly 2,106,843 fans have seen 274 games in the 20 years the Spectrum has housed Aggie basketball.

The Spectrum—one of the nation's most complete college arenas—comfortably seats 10,270 (5,000 student capacity and 3,800 season ticket availabilities). All are chair-back seats done in a pleasant color scheme of light orange, dark orange, light gold and yellow. There are 36 rows of seats completely encircling the floor.

**Virtually every need common to the staging of a major college game or tournament is provided for including complete dressing room and meeting room facilities for four teams. Aggie teams use the north locker rooms and the visitors the south facilities. The teams enter the playing floor via nearby ramps.**

The playing floor is permanent and is constructed of maple on a cushion, over concrete. The recently installed solid-state sound system is the most modern available with a newly engineered design and latest equipment. It replaces a 15-year old sound system. Scoreboards are installed at each end of the Spectrum. Block lighting will allow gatherings of groups from 2,500 to 7,000 to meet in compact seating arrangements.

The Smith Spectrum has been the site of special events throughout the years. Such events as Theatre in the Round, concerts and general assemblies for the USU Studentbody and the community make the facility in demand constantly.

During the mid-1970s (1974) a proposal was presented to create a trophy -- a symbol to be awarded annually to Utah's best college basketball team. The concept was accepted and for the first two years the in-state title was awarded to the Aggies, although no actual trophy had been determined.

In 1977, after Weber State won the title for the first time, an Ogden business man located a pioneer bucket at a local auction, complete with a history of how it had been found. It has since become the traveling trophy emblematic of Utah college basketball supremacy.

USU's third-year Head coach Kohn Smith and his 1990-91 Aggies head into the season intent on returning the trophy to the Spectrum. The Aggies have posted a 28-20 record in-state the past eight years.

The bucket is named after the Oquirrh Mountains, located on the west side of the Salt Lake Valley.

Utah State's Big Blue Club — once organized as the Buck-O-Month Club — has begun a fifth decade of support for USU Athletics.

The Big Blue Club is a booster organization promoting academic and athletic achievement by providing grant-in-aid assistance to qualified men and women student-athletes seeking an education at Utah State.

Many of the roadblocks facing intercollegiate athletics today are financial. Membership in the Big Blue Club, or one of the areas of gifts to athletics, allows the coaches to offer grant-in-aid assistance to prospective student-athletes. The grant-in-aid in turn provides student-athletes the opportunity to receive a quality education at USU.

On July 1, 1988, the Pacific Coast Athletic Association marked the beginning of the league's 20th year by changing its name to the Big West Conference.

The name is seen as a simpler, more accurate description of the league's 11 member institutions (Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, Long Beach State, New Mexico State, San Jose State, UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara, Hawaii, UNLV, Pacific and Utah State.)

When the league was first formed in 1969, it consisted of seven charter members, all of which were located in the state of California. As the league enters its 22nd season, the conference has expanded to include universities from states which are not on or near the Pacific coast (Utah, Nevada and New Mexico).

In its first 22 seasons, the Big West Conference has made numerous positive strides.

In past seasons highlights have included UNLV's 1990 NCAA basketball title and the 1987 NCAA basketball championships when, for the first time ever, the conference had a representative in both the men's (UNLV) and the women's (Long Beach State) Final Four.

The Big West Conference office is headed by third year commissioner Jim Haney. Haney is only the third fulltime commissioner in the history of the conference. He succeeded Lew Cryer, who guided the conference through 10 years of expansion and growth. Jesse Hill was named the first fulltime commissioner of the league, January of 1972.
