In All Honesty: Big West Play Revisited

Tonight the Aggies face former Big West rival UC-Santa Barbara. The Gauchos are led in their Aggie FANS however.... backcourt by leading scorer Alex Harris (20.2 Points Per Game, and a Jaycee-esque 46% from 3-point in elementary school (and maybe some of us in range) and sophomore James Powell (11.7 points per game). ESPN Networks forced to put USU game on ESPNU for safety concerns

Friday night marks the beginning of the ESPN's annual Bracketbuster weekend, which matches up mid-major teams against one another based on their performance throughout the first three months of the basketball season. The match-up between Utah State and UC Santa Barbara is one of only two Bracketbuster games taking place on Friday night along with Davidson vs. Winthrop. While Davidson-Winthrop will be shown on ESPN2, the USU-UCSB game will only be found on ESPNU. The reason for this, according to ESPN, is that a televised game at The Spectrum gets to be so loud and intense that small children are often frightened and in rare cases traumatized from seeing such madness on their television screen.

Mark Braddock, a spokesman for ESPN, commented on the matter saving, "We at ESPN fully realized that Utah State versus Santa Barbara is obviously the more intriguing game between our two televised Bracketbusters for Friday.
